WHAT OTHERS DO

Walla Walla, Wash , Oct. 18-(Special) -Fifteen cars of fancy apples have been pooled by Seth Ferrel and Fred Raha, Mill Creek orchardists, who are asking \$1,75 a box for the fruit. Be-tween 8,000 and 10,000 boxes of aptween \$,000 and 10,000 boxes of apples are held in the pool, Many o'lers have been made for the apples, including one from an English tirm, and several of them are said to be close to the mark at which they are held. If sold at the price asked by the farmers the fruit will make a cash return of about \$12,50 a tree, Each of the farmers named has about 500 trees.

The above is a dispatch from Walla Walla to the Oregonian. Counting 50 tons to the acre, and \$1.50 to the tree, it will be seen that the return per acre for a single crop is \$625. What will your acre tract be worth if you can gather even \$500 worth of apples? Any commercial orchardist will tell you that \$625 is a small return per acre.
