LIQUOR SELLERS PAY MORE FINES

COUNTY TREASURY ENRICHED BY TOTAL OF \$3300—RECORD OF COURT.
Fines amounting to \$3300 have been assessed and collected from 13 persons indicted by the July grand jury for selling intoxicating liquor, and who pleaded guilty since the beginning of the November term. In addition, George Wright, under a \$200 cash bond for the same offense, and indicted by the November grand jury, has skipped to parts unknown, forfeiting his bond, so there's a total of \$3300 already in the county treasury from these sources.
Old and Elijah Wolfe of Wallowa, against the former of whom there are four indictments and two against the latter, alleging the same offense, have entered pleas of not guilty and will stand trial. Their cases are concluded for the term. The remaining indictments against Sybil Gilliam of Joseph are suspended.

In addition to the \$2550 of fines reported in our last issue, are the following sentences:
J. W. Emmons, fined \$200.
Charles Carlson, fined \$250.
Mitchell & Pipes, found guilty at the July term. Mitchell fined \$350 and to serve 20 days in jail; Pipes fined \$250 and to serve 30 days in jail. Case appealed to Supreme court. Now come in, dismiss their appeal, plead guilty and pay their fines and costs, amounting in all to over \$700. The court paroles both for 30 days.
Two civil suits have been tried by jury, and the old time case of DeVall vs. DeVall is occupying the time if not the attention of judge and jury Friday. Following is the

N. H. Marks vs. S. L. Burnaugh et al. Verdict for defendants in sum of \$260 and costs. Plaintiff granted five days in which to file a motion to set aside the judgment.
Ed Chapman vs. H. A. and W. T. Quisenberry. Verdict for plaintiff in sum of \$29.

Wright In Charge Enterprise Central
Manager Crowe Makes Change—New Toll Line to Innaha Completed.
T. J. Wright has been appointed head operator of the Enterprise central by Manager S. D. Crowe, and took charge of the office Friday morning. Mr. Crowe reports the rebuilding of the Innaha line completed, and says the company has spent \$2000 on the line making it practically new. Hereafter a toll of 25cents will be charged for talking over that line to Innaha and the three subscribers on the main line, C. L. Hartshorn, Longfellow & Arnold, and Davin & Mitchell.
The Crow Creek line has been taken over by the Home Independent company, and as soon as the local line from here east is extended to Jewell's, the Crow Creek line will be connected to it, and all the subscribers along the local and the present Crow Creek line will have exclusive connection with Enterprise central, with no toll charge.

Four New Citizens Given Final Papers

Two Others Make Petition For Naturalization to Circuit Judge Knowles.

Christ Eauer of Enterprise, a native of Germany, who came to this country in 1884; August Koepf of Wallowa, born in Germany, who came to the United States in the Centennial year; Theophile Blanc of Joseph, born in sunny France, but a resident of this greater Republic for 11 years; and Alfred Benjamin Davies, of Troy, a native of England, who has been a resident of the United States since 1895, were granted their final papers by Judge Knowles and took the oath of allegiance.
Gunnard Christopherson of Wallowa and William Freudenberg of Joseph have filed petitions for their final papers. The former is a native of Norway and has been a resident of this country since 1873. Freudenberg was born in Germany and came to the United States in 1896.

HOME RULE AMENDMENT.

Attorney General Crawford holds that the Home Rule amendment becomes effective as soon as proclaimed by the governor and, in answer to an inquiry of E. D. Walck of Joseph, says that in towns, like Joseph, that voted wet while the county as a whole voted dry, the licensing of saloons will be in the hands of the council as soon as the amendment is made a part of the organic law of the state.

ROGNAS P. O. DISCONTINUED.

The post-office at Rognas, north-east of Wallowa, was discontinued, Tuesday, by order of the department, because of insufficient business.

FOOTBALL GAME ENDS IN MURDER CHARGE

Wheeler, W. Va.—A warrant charging Thomas McCoy, right end of the Bethany College football team, with murder in connection with the death of Captain Rudolph Munk, of the West Virginia team, was issued here by Magistrate Hobbs. The action followed a partial inquest by Coroner Rogers.
Munk sustained injuries in the game between the two teams Saturday from which he died five hours later without regaining consciousness. The testimony was furnished principally by Homer N. Young, a Pittsburg attorney, who umpired the game.

Deliberate Blow Charged.

Young testified that Munk was making interference and was a few yards in front of the scrimmage line when McCoy came up to the West Virginia captain, striking him on the head. Munk fell to the ground unconscious and Young ordered McCoy from the game.
The autopsy disclosed that Munk's death was caused by a blood clot at the base of his brain and could not have been the result of a former injury.

County Court Is Given Due Credit

Grand Jury Report For November Term 1910, Wallowa County, State of Oregon.

We, the Grand Jury for the November Term of the Wallowa County Circuit Court, beg leave to report as follows:
We have been in continuous session for three days, and returned into court two true bills and two not true bills of indictments.

We have carefully investigated all charges of any violations of the laws of this state that have been brought to our attention, and have not concluded all the testimony upon all such charges.
We have inspected the offices and records of the sheriff, clerk, county surveyor, and the county assessor, and find them neatly kept, and as far as we could discover, properly kept in all respects.
We would respectfully recommend that the County Court grade the court house lawn, in accordance with the established grades, and from each corner of the court house, a cement sidewalk be constructed of suitable dimensions, to each corner of the public square, and a similar walk on all sides of the court-house building.

We recommend that a typewriter be purchased for the office and use of the District Attorney, in handling the business of his office, and taking the testimony before the Grand Jury. As it now appears, it is necessary to deprive, during the terms of court, some other office of a machine in order that this work may be properly done.
The Grand Jury desires at this time to compliment the County Court in having erected and furnished as commodious and convenient a courthouse for this county, as can be found in the state, and at an expense, far less than many more imposing but less convenient structures.
We wish to express our thanks to His Honor for courteous treatment, and the District Attorney and his deputy for faithful attention to our various demands, and to the other officers and bailiffs for considerate response to our wants during the entire session.
We respectfully ask to be relieved from further duty at this duty.
We desire to be relieved from further duty, and until the further order of this court.

WANTS COURT TO DECIDE COAL CASES

Washington—The secretary of the interior will recommend in his annual report, soon to be made public, that the entire group of Alaska coal land cases, dealing with what are known as the Cunningham claims, be taken entirely out of the jurisdiction of the interior department, so far as their final consideration and adjudication are concerned and placed under the jurisdiction of the court of appeals of the District of Columbia.
For several months these cases have, at the request of Secretary Ballinger, been given entirely into the hands of President Taft for his special direction, with a view that no action be taken in the matter without the president's sanction, and now that the time is drawing near when a final disposition of these important cases must be made, Mr. Ballinger is anxious that they shall be placed in such a position that even the most biased citizen may feel that no sort of personal leaning on the part of department heads will be a factor in the final decision.

Express Strike Ends.

New York—The strike of the express wagon drivers, which has paralyzed business in New York and vicinity and threatened to result in a general teamsters' walkout, is practically ended. The express companies agree to take back the strikers and consult with representatives of the employees regarding wages and hours.
