Eugene.—Through the efforts of Professor Young, head of the department of economics, a bureau of statistics has been established in the university library when, it is believed, will be of great service to the state at large in municipal matters. This new feature will be in the form of a municipal reform library which is to be a sort of clearing house for all municipal literature. Oregon cities and city reform organizations desiring to investigate questions relative to improved city government will have free access to all records and references. The idea of such a bureau at the university was suggested by similar ones at the universities of Wisconsin, Kansas and Illinois and of Brown University, where similar libraries have proved of great service to municipalities and improvement leagues.
