**Over \$27,000 Worth
Of Claims Approved**
First Meeting of Creditors of W. F. Rankin—Henry Fletcher Trustee.

Bankruptcy Referee J. S. Holden presided over the first meeting of creditors of W. F. Rankin in the circuit court room Monday. Over 40 creditors were present and filed claims. Over \$27,000 worth of secured and unsecured claims were passed while considerable more were con-

tinued for further investigation. Mr. Rankin's estimate of his assets is \$54,000, and indebtedness \$35,000. The assets include 139,000 shares of mining stock put in at a valuation of \$14,000.
W. W. White, V. I. Cronin and Walter Franklin were named as appraisers.
Henry Fletcher was elected trustee, and his bond fixed at \$5,000.

**Sheriff Makes Report To Clerk—
Only \$7216 Delinquent On
Big Roll.**

Sheriff Edgar Marvin has made his tax collection report to the County Clerk as follows:

3 per cent rebate allowed.....2267 72
Errors and double assessments.....8897 16
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The above shows remarkably good collections, there being only about \$1000 more delinquent than on the roll last year that was \$30,000 less in total levied.

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**TWO PRAIRIE CREEK
RANCHES BARGAINED FOR**

Two big real estate deals on Prairie Creek are in negotiation. J. J. McDonald of Cass county, N. D., has bargained for E. O. Makin's ranch of 720 acres for \$23,000 and Harry Nottingham's place of 310 acres, adjoining Makin's, for \$70 an acre.

Messrs. McDonald and Nottingham went to Portland, Sunday, to see the former's broker and complete the deals.

McDonald has also bargained for Makin's lambs at \$2.50 each, and his hay at \$4 a ton.

The deals were made through J. D. Walck of Joseph.

Mr. McDonald is also reported as having bought of Wm. Stiekney his ranch just west of Joseph for a little less than \$20,000. This ranch consists of 310 acres.

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
