Official Proceedings Of County Court

November Term, 1910.

Second Judicial Day, November 21. Court met pursuant to adjournment. In the matter of declaring the result of the vote for prohibition and against prohibition held in Wallowa county, Oregon, November 8, 1910:

It appearing to the court that on October 6, 1910, a petition was filed with the Clerk of this County signed by more than 10 per cent of the registered voters of said county, praying that on the 8th day of November, 1910, an election be held to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors should be prohibited in said county as a whole, and the court having duly ordered such election on the 7th day of October, 1910, as appears by the records of this court, and it further appearing to the court that said petition was filed with the Clerk not less than thirty nor more than ninety days before such election, and it further appearing that the County Clerk on receipt of such petition immediately filed the same and compared the signatures of electors signing the same with the signatures on the registration books of the election then pending, and with the signatures on the registration books and blanks on file in his office for the preceding general election, and it appearing that petition contained the requisite number of signatures of qualified electors as required by law, and it further appearing that at least twenty days previous to such election the County Clerk delivered to the Sheriff of said county at least five notices of the election for each election precinct in the County in form as required by law, and it further appearing that said Sheriff at least twelve days before such election posted said notices in public places in the vicinity of the polling places and that said Clerk and Sheriff have previously entered a record of their compliance of the provisions of the law in the premises: that the ballots for such election were duly arranged and printed according to law, that said election was duly held on the 8th day of November, 1910, as required by law, and afterwards the vote was duly canvassed and abstracted

and it further appearing to the Court from the duly certified abstract of the votes of said election held on November 8, 1910, to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes for the entire county of Wallowa, for prohibition received 115 votes and against prohibition received 699 votes, and it appearing to the Court that the result of said election for the entire County of Wallowa was for prohibition: Therefore, it is hereby ordered and considered by the Court that the sale of intoxicating liquors is hereby absolutely prohibited within the limits of Wallowa County, Oregon, except for the purposes and under the regulations specified by law.

Third Judicial Day, November 23. In the matter of a lawing miscellaneous bills against the County:

The Court having passed upon and audited each of said bills separately as appears from the signature of the Court thereon, It is therefore considered and ordered by the Court that the said bills be allowed in classes and amounts as follows, to wit:
