TIME FOR CONCERTED ACTION.

Several merchants of Enterprise and other towns on the branch line, were asked a year ago last summer, by a representative of the O. R. & N. if they would prefer a service consisting of a passenger train in and out each day, and a freight train in one day and out the next, instead of the present service of a mixed train each way daily.

What answer was given by a majority of those asked at that time we do not know, but it is safe to say the unanimous answer now would be, "Give us a daily passenger, and every other day, freight."

The service on the branch this fall has been, to use the expressive slang, "terrible." For weeks the train was from one to four hours late daily. Strangers coming with a view to locate or invest were disgusted with the train service, and without stopping to look the country over, left the next morning.

About six weeks ago a representative of some men of wealth whose attention had been directed to this valley, came in to see about investments that if made would have resulted in several scores of families coming here and the establishment of a small factory. He left in 36 hours saying he would not return until there was a decent train service; that it would be useless to attempt to bring his men in 80 miles on a freight train as they would be prejudiced against the country before they reached here.

Freight every other day is as often as it comes now, so that part of the service would be no worse.

The development of this county is being retarded by the present train service. We believe if this matter was put up to the head officers of the company by the combined action of the commercial clubs and shippers of the county relief would be granted.

STATE AND NATIONAL ASSOCIATIONS MEET IN PORTLAND FIRST WEEK JANUARY.

Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers association, writes that the 13th annual convention of the association will be held at Portland, January 3, 1911, just one day before the opening of the great 47th annual convention of the National association and Mid-winter Sheep Show.

The O. R. & N. has granted a one and one-third fare for the round trip with privilege of attending both conventions, Portland and her great Commercial Club are preparing to give the wool growers this time of their lives.

It will be a business session discussing Tariff, Forest Reserves, Quarantine and Speed Limit Laws, Predatory Animals, Wool Sales, appointment of Advisory Boards and other subjects especially important and vital to the industry. The most prominent and expert men in America on these subjects have places on the program of the National Convention. The Mid-Winter Sheep Show promises to be the best ever held in America.

We shall have greatest sheep show ever held in Oregon, says Geo. W. McKnight of Vale; president of the association, "Our breeders will have a great chance to show their stock, and if we win in the coming competition they can safely take their sheep anywhere in the world."

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.
