KNOWN STOCKMANCHARLES G. HOLMES PASSES
AWAY AT COW CREEK RANCH
—FUNERAL TODAY.Charles G. Holmes, one of the
best known stockmen of Wallowa
county, died at 3 o'clock Monday
morning at his stock camp on Cow
Creek, about 60 miles northeast of
this city, of uraemic poisoning. Dr.
J. H. Thompson of Joseph, and neph-
ew, Fred Holmes, of this city, were
with him when he passed away. The
doctor came up the trail to Innaha
bridge Monday morning and phoned
the sad message to W. R. Holmes.News soon became known
around town, and caused a shock
for few had heard of his illness.Mr. Holmes was ill of kidney trou-
ble a couple of weeks ago, but sent
out for medicine and recovered so
well that he spent most of last week
on horseback, tending to his cattle.
He took ill again Friday noon, and
a man working for him came to In-
naha bridge and telephoned W. R.
Holmes who sent out the doctor
and his son Fred. They arrived at
the camp Saturday night and remain-
ed with him to the end.The deceased was not only well
known but was universally esteemed
and his many friends expressed
deep sorrow.The men at the camp started up
the trail out of the canyon, bearing
the body. They were met part way
out by J. A. Funk, who had been
phoned the news. A hack was also
sent from this city, and by constanttravelling the party reached Enter-
prise at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning
with the body.Funeral will be held from the
home of W. R. Holmes at 1 o'clock,
this, Wednesday afternoon, and will
be buried with Masonic honors, Wal-
lowa lodge 82, of which the deceased
was a member, having charge of the
rites.Charles Gabriel Holmes, son of
L. R. and Jane (Gabriel) Holmes was
born in Memphis, Tenn., February
17, 1861, and shortly after his birth
his parents removed back to the North
on one of the last boats to make the
up-river trip before the outbreak of
the great Civil war.In 1863 the Holmes family came
across the plains to Bannock and
Virginia City, Mont., where there
was great mining excitement at that
time. Afterwards the family removed
by wagon to Salt Lake City, Utah,
thence to Walla Walla, coming thru
southern Idaho, cross the Snake, up
Powder Valley into the Grande Ronde
and across the Blue Mountains. In
1868 the elder Holmes brought his
family to Cove and there made his
home until his death about 20 years
ago. His widow died in 1899.Charles Holmes came to this coun-
ty first, when only 18 years of age.
His father and older brother were
running stock in this county. He
took up land on Alder Slope a little
later on, the place now owned by
Sam Litch. Afterwards he went in-
to the cattle business—about 22 years
ago—buying his brother George's
place on Crow Creek, and has fol-
lowed the business ever since with
good success. He built himself a
fine new home on his ranch a year
or so ago.The deceased was never married.
He had great affection for his nephew

OF VALLEY TOWNSENTERPRISE MAKES NEARLY
TWICE INCREASE OF OTHERS
COMBINED.The total valuation of the four
valley towns is almost one-fifth that
for the whole county. The total for
the towns is \$1,883,423, excluding
railroads, telephones, etc. Last year
the total for the four towns, includ-
ing railroads, etc., was \$1,640,650.Following is the assessed valuation
of the towns for 1910, together with
the increase over 1909, bearing in mind
the 1909 figures included the rail-
roads while this year's do not:

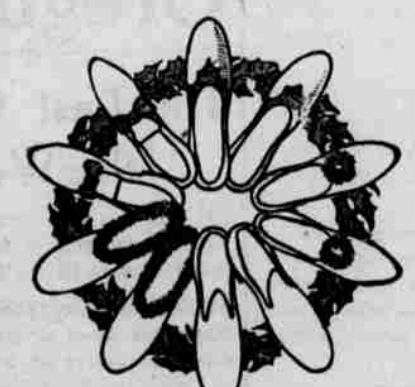

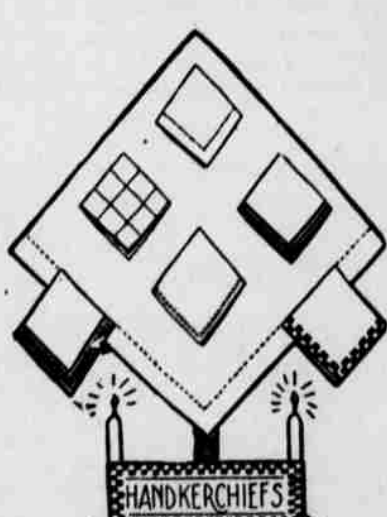
