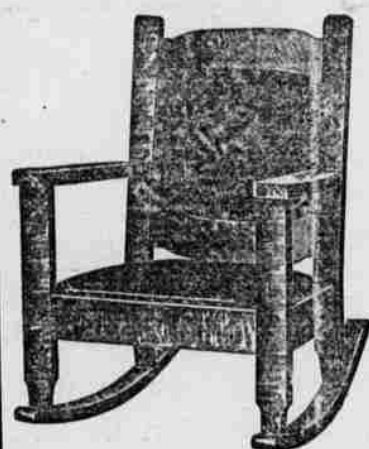

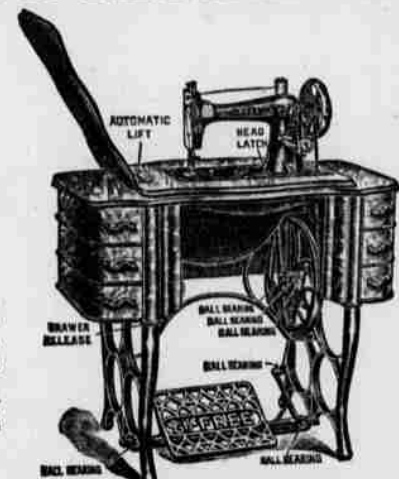

### Erect Monument To Levi J. Rouse

Splendid Memorial for Pioneer, Instructor and Benefactor of Wallowa County.

A beautiful monument marking the resting place of Levi J. Rouse has been erected in the Enterprise cemetery by his friends in Wallowa county.  
The Masons started the movement to thus honor the memory of one who did so much good for the county and for the people, but so many outside the fraternity expressed a wish to contribute the matter was thrown open and the monument is a reminder of the general esteem in which Mr. Rouse was and is held by the people of Wallowa county.  
The stone is of handsome black Maine granite, dressed and carved by Mr. Charles Wilgord of this city and contains besides Mr. Rouse's name, years of birth and death, a Keystone, High Priest jewel and the following words: "Erected by many friends in Wallowa county in whose memory he still lives as a Pioneer, Instructor and Benefactor."  
The monument cost \$250. The work of securing the subscriptions was in charge of D. W. Sheahan and Daniel Boyd.

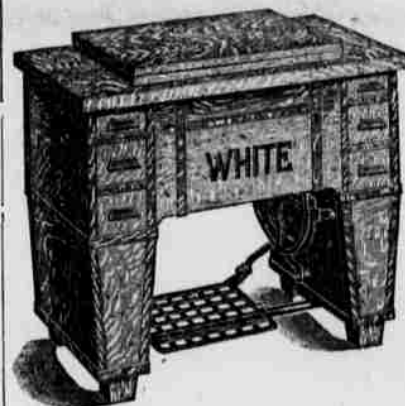
