## RAILROAD'S NEW YEAR'S GIFT.

The announcement of the traffic department of the new Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company in this paper, is of great importance to Oregon and of particular interest to Wallowa county.

One of the first pieces of railroad news, locally, after the formation of the company, is that better passenger service will be given this branch without interfering with the freight service, very early in the spring.



(b) Civil Government — United States Constitution.

(d) History—List of Topics from History Outline in State Course of Study and Current Events.
