GOOD ROAD BOGIES.

There are some people who are
never happy unless they are seeing
bogies. They imagine the direst re-
sults from the simplest causes. This
is especially true about new and
untried things like good roads.

Unless we are misinformed, none
of the five good roads bills before
the legislature takes the making
and control of roads from the coun-
ty courts. Automobile speedways
will not be built unless the coun-
ty court orders the same. In fact
there will be no change from now un-
less the county court takes the in-
itiative.

These bills simply provide ways
and plans by which a county may
build permanent roads if it wants
to do so.

Bonds, roadmaking machinery, auto-
mobile speedways and all the other

bogies are products of the imagina-
tion. The people of each county
will continue to be boss of the roads
in their county.

True, one bill provides for a state
highway commissioner but his work
will be mainly advisory. If he is a
scientific roadmaker he will be a
good investment.

Except running a newspaper, there
is no business or trade that so many
people think they know all about
as roadmaking, and really know so
little.

FREE LIBRARY.

Enterprise city council has set
aside for the public library one-half
mill of the levy for city purposes.
This is a generous provision for the
first year and the money wisely ex-
pended will give the library a good
start. It will be a useful institution
from the beginning.

The library under the fostering
care of the ladies of the improvement
association, has already a large num-
ber of books, especially of the popu-
lar kind—fiction—and the reference
volumes that come from the state
will be of aid to students. It is
now kept open two afternoons each
week, but after the tax money be-
comes available it is the intention
to add a reading room with maga-
zines, papers, etc., and keep it and
the library open every afternoon
and evening.

Of course a board should be ap-
pointed to watch over the needs of
the library, its administration and
management, and if we are pardoned
the advice, we would suggest the
board be composed of one member of
the council and a library committee
from the Ladies Improvement associ-
ation.

lift of a community, women are more
effective workers than men.

"good people."

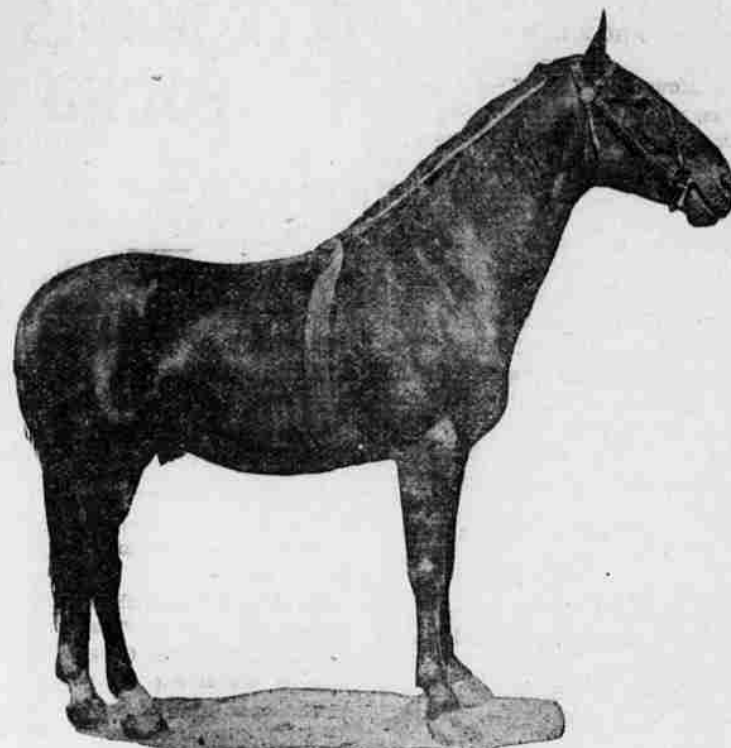
They are the salt of the earth and

PROSPEROUS TILLAMOOK.

Tillamook county in its isolation
was not unlike Wallowa. While
much nearer to Portland, yet it was
farther from a railroad than this
county was before the extension of
the line two years ago.

Tillamook, however, had frontage
on the sea, and if its products could
be brought to the coast, cheap trans-
portation bore them to the outside
markets. That little word IF
stood in the way, and it represent-
ed immense difficulties. Tillamook
was a hard country in which to
make good roads. Mountain and bot-
toms—the two extremes but alike in

States Constitution.

(c) Geography—State Course of
Study; Redway and Hinman's Na-
tural School Geography.

(d) History—List of Topics from
History Outline in State Course
of Study and Current Events.

(e) Grammar—Buckhorn's Modern
English Grammar, no diagram-
ming.

(f) Physiology—Graded Lessons in
