DOG MUZZLES MUST COMPLY WITH THE LAW.

Notice: All dogs must wear a wire or leather muzzle (if of leather, it must have a wide band of leather starting not over 1/2 inch below eyes, and running beyond the end of and around the nose, and fit tight); this to prevent dogs when loose (not tied up with a chain) from biting or picking up any poisoned article.

All dogs must wear an approved muzzle at all times except when chained, except hunting dogs on an actual hunt, or dogs kept alone in an enclosed building or in an enclosed yard that they cannot get out of, or with other animals. Otherwise they may be shot on sight by any accredited officer in the county of Wallawa.

This notice to be in effect from the first day of February, 1911, and until further notice by the state or county veterinarian.

OREGON LEADS NATION.
The leaders of the progressive wing of the Republican party have formed the National Progressive Republican league. We say wing but that part of the party is rapidly becoming the whole bird, and will easily dominate the national convention in 1912.

The league numbers among its charter members all the live, up-to-date leaders in and out of congress, including Senators LaFollette, Cummins, Beveridge, Clapp, Brown, Brice, Bourne, Poindexter, Congressmen Madison, Haugen, Murdock, Madden, Cooper and many others. Ex-President Roosevelt endorses the league and its platform in a signed article in the Outlook.

The platform is practically an endorsement of the Oregon plan, and includes direct election of U. S. senators by the people, the direct primary, selection of presidential candidates by the people at a primary, the initiative, referendum and recall. Senator Bourne is the first president, an honor to him and to Oregon.

UNDESIRABLE PUBLICITY.
The story of cattle bitten by coyotes, going mad and drowning in Snake river, near the mouth of the Grande Ronde in Washington, nearly 70 miles from here, was sent out from Wallawa, and this county got the benefit (?) of the advertising. There are ninety-nine parts exaggeration to one part truth in the coyote stories.

Everybody is hoping the reports of rich strikes in the mines near here are true. There is no doubt there is plenty of mineral in the mountains that form a beautiful crescent about Enterprise from the northwest to the southeast.

Senator Oliver has introduced bills to allow the sheriffs of Wallawa and Union counties each \$600 a year for expenses, and to fix the salary of the superintendent of schools in Wallawa county at \$1200 a year.

Permanent roads mean all-the-year around roads. Days that farmers cannot work on their farms because of wet ground or storms, they can haul heavy loads to market.

Having a good road to travel a farmer near Eugene with a two-horse team trotted along easily to town hauling 3870 pounds of hay, says the Guard.

BUTTER MAY DROP SOON.

Local Market is Holding, But Outside Market May Force Issue.

There is a weaker feeling generally in the butter market, but for the fresh local product prices are still being maintained. There has been another drop in California values and this may have some effect upon quotations here during the near future. The big drop at Elgin this week is also a bearish factor and unless local quotations recede importations from the east are likely. The last quotation at Elgin was 25c a pound, which would mean that the stock could be laid down here by express at 29c.
