In Canyons.

Grouse, April 29 — Farmers are just finishing up the spring seeding. There is some complaint on the benches of the dry weather, as the small grain is not showing as nicely as was expected. Grass in the canyons is the poorest that it has been for several years, owing to the continued dry weather.
Fall wheat is looking unusually fine. There never has been a more promising prospect for a bountiful fruit crop; cherries, peaches, plums and prunes just in full bloom and in fine condition; apple buds just showing up nicely.
There has been more sickness in the vicinity of Grouse than has been since the country has been settled, mostly la grippe and rheumatism. There have been several calls for Dr. Gilmore of Flora.
