NOTICE TO NEWS-RECORD SUBSCRIBERS.

Next Wednesday will be the last issue of the Twice-a-Week News-Record. After that date, this paper will be consolidated with the Wallowa County Chieftain and a big weekly will be issued on Thursdays, named the Record Chieftain. Its price will be \$1.50 a year in advance. All paid in advance subscriptions to the News-Record will receive due advance credit on the Record Chieftain at the reduced rate, and as soon as possible statements will be mailed to each one showing the credit given and the exact state of the account. This change is made for several reasons, the first and chief being the miserable mail service in this county, on account of which the majority of the subscribers to the Twice-a-week paper lost the benefit of the frequency of issue. Complaint has been common from the North End, for instance, that both issues arrived together, although invariably a mail left Wallowa for Flora between mailings of the papers. There were other reasons that needn't be entered on at this time but one should be stated: With one paper and one interest, we will give better service, more newspaper and better satisfaction. This in itself is sufficient reason for the change. Hoping you will give the new order of things a fair trial, and then if you have any kick coming, that you will register your complaint at head quarters, we remain, very respectfully
