Supervisor Rushing reported a forest fire in the neighborhood, covering an area of two acres, it had been caused by the volcanic disturbance.

Mount Lassen is situated on the boundary between Plumas and Shasta Counties, in the Sierra Nevada Range. It is 10,437 feet high and is of volcanic origin. There are plenty of evidences of comparatively recent volcanic life to be found on the mountain, but there has been no previous disturbances within the memory of the white population of Northern California, according to Govern-Official verification of the report ment officials.
