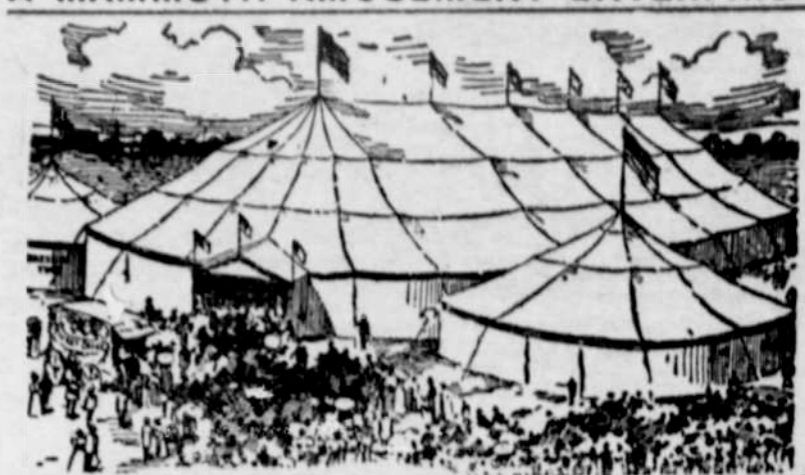

Extracts From Commonwealth Conference

A. H. Harris, editor of the Labor Press of Portland, and a member of the Workingmens Compensation Commission, surprised the conference by declaring that the minimum wage was wrong in theory and would not work well in practice as advocated by Dr. Parker of California. Mr. Harris declared: "The minimum wage theory presumes it is possible to fix a living wage of subsistence for one class by another, when no class has any right to declare what the level of existence for another class should be." Mr. Harris' utterances seemed to be free from taint of unhealthy sentimentalism and academic cant.

Such practical matters as building state buildings of Oregon stone that would open stone quarries and employ stone masons in fabricating material instead of shipping it in already manufactured did not concern the professional prosperity restorers at the conference.
