INDEPENDENCE HAS FIRE

Old Hotel Building Damaged and Cigar Factory Loss Put at \$2500.

Independence, Or., July 16.—Fire today in the old hotel building on Second and C streets, in this city, caused a loss of about \$2500. The cause of the fire is not known. It started in the back of the cigar factory of A. W. Kibler & Co.

The old hotel building is owned by J. M. Stark, of Eugene, Or., and has been damaged by fire a number of times in the last 20 years. The heaviest loser is the A. W. Kibler Company, who lost all stock, fixtures and cigars valued at \$1500. Insurance for \$750 was carried. The loss on the building was fully covered by insurance.

All that part of Prospect avenue beginning at the intersection of Fifth street with Prospect avenue and running thence east to the intersection of Prospect avenue with Alder street;

All that part of Alder street beginning at the intersection of Prospect avenue with Alder street and running thence north to the intersection of Alder street with Fair Oaks avenue;

All that part of Fair Oaks avenue beginning at the intersection of Alder street with Fair Oaks avenue and running thence east to the intersection of Fair Oaks avenue with Ellis street;

All that part of Ellis street beginning at the intersection of Fair Oaks avenue with Ellis street and running thence south to the intersection of Ellis street with North Main street;

All that part of Sheldon avenue beginning at the south line of the right of way of the Salem, Falls City & Western Railroad in said Sheldon avenue and running thence southeasterly in Sheldon avenue to the city limits of Falls City, Oregon;

All the above described streets and parts of streets being located and situated in the city of Falls City, Polk County, Oregon.

That said improvement will consist in general in the construction of macadam pavement on a grade heretofore established by Ordinance, such improvement to be made at the time and in the manner to be hereafter prescribed by Ordinance.

That the cost of said improvement, and the whole thereof, except the cost of improving street intersections, will be assessed to the real property fronting and abutting thereon; and

That the city council of said city will sit in the council chamber of said city on the 28th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock in the evening of said day and at said time and place to hear and determine objections and remonstrances thereto, if any there be, and,

That all owners and other person in interest may attend at said time and place and show cause if any they have, why such proposed improvements should not be made.

The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

WHEN SERVING FIGS.

BREAKFAST MENU.
Hashed Lamb on Toast.
Figs.
Figs and Apple Jam.
Coffee.

FIGS contain from 50 to 75 per cent of fruit sugars; consequently when combined with other foods they contribute much of the necessary sweetening.

Fig Salad.—Stuff figs with chopped celery and nut meats and serve on lettuce with grapefruit pulp, dressed with mayonnaise.

A Combination Jam.

Fig and Apple Jam.—Take five pounds of peeled and sliced tart apples and add to them five pounds of ripe figs and five pounds of granulated sugar. Cook until as thick as desired. Cool before sealing.

Fig Mold.—To one quart of boiling milk add one-half cupful of sugar, a tablespoonful of salt and three tablespoonfuls of cornstarch dissolved in a half cupful of cold water. Cook in a double boiler for an hour; then add one cupful of steamed and chopped figs and lemon juice to flavor. Turn into a mold and serve when cold with whipped and sweetened cream.

Fruit and Cereal.

Rice With Fig Sauce.—Take one cupful of rice, wash thoroughly and put over the fire in a small saucepan with one cupful of boiling water. Cook until the water is absorbed. Have in the double boiler three cupfuls of scalding hot milk, add the rice and a half teaspoonful of salt. Steam until the rice is tender. Meantime cut fine enough figs to make a generous cupful, add water to cover and stew with a tablespoonful of sugar to sweeten. Cook until of the consistency required; then flavor with lemon juice and a little of the grated yellow rind of lemon. Serve with the hot boiled rice.

Figs With Rhubarb.—Take two bunches rhubarb, wash them and cut in inch pieces without peeling. Put into a double boiler with a cupful of sugar and four or five figs cut in small pieces. Cover and cook over the hot water until the rhubarb is tender and the sirup rich and jelly-like in consistency. Raisins may be used with the figs. If you have a hot oven put the rhubarb and figs in a stone pot, cover closely and bake in the oven until jelly.
