Roy Gardner Dead

Roy, the 15-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Gardner died very suddenly Sunday night of sugar diabetes. The deceased had not been sick but a few days and it was not thought to be serious until Sunday when he grew worse.

The deceased was born and reared in Falls City and was well liked by all who knew him. He was deliveryman for the department store of N. Selig.

Funeral services were conducted at the home by Rev. B. L. Hicks of the Christian church and interment was made in the Odd Fellows cemetery Tuesday.

Death of Jacob Rhodabarger

Jacob Rhodabarger died at his home in Falls City, Wednesday Sept. 9. Funeral services were held at the M. E. Church and interment in the Falls City cemetery Thursday.

Jacob Rhodabarger was born in Venango Co., Pa., on the 24th day of June, 1835, and died at Falls City, Ore., on the 9th day of Sept. 1914 at the age of 79 years, 2 months and 15 days. He was in his usual health until Friday of last week when he was taken ill and grew worse until the end came.

He was united in marriage to Abigail Perry on the 7th day of Dec. 1865. Nine children were born, three of which died in infancy.

The following children still survive him: Mrs. A. J. Shipley, Monmouth, Ore., Mrs. A. H. Hecox, Iola, Kas., F. W. Rhodabarger, Albany, Ore., Mrs. L. T. Murphy and Mrs. J. C. Talbot, Falls City, and Mrs. J. E. Beezley, Salem.

Mr. Rhodabarger was one of the builders of the Methodist church in our city, of which he has been an official member for many years. The many beautiful flowers and expressions of regret show how the deceased was loved and respected by the Falls City citizens.

Receipts for the week have been as follows: Cattle-879, Calves-54, Hogs-2437, Sheep-2886.

Cattle market steady for the week, top steers 6.75 to 7.00; cows 5.75 to 6.00; heifers 6.00 to 6.25; choice beef bulls firmer at 4.75, and veal market strong 8.00 to 8.50. Receipts were under normal.

Swine trade steady to firm throughout. Best quality light stock 9.00 to 9.25. Smooth heavy weights 8.00 to 8.25. Receipts somewhat smaller compared with a week ago.

Both mutton and lambs in strong position. Yearling wethers advanced ten to fifteen cents. Fancy lambs brought 6.00, and fat killing ewes 4.35. Outlet broad and demand steady. Receipts comparatively light.
