Council Meeting

The council met in regular session Tuesday night and transacted the regular business. There was a "full house" with the exception of Mayor Hubbard, who on account of having a couple of teeth amputated, staid at home. Tom Hollowell acted in his stead.

The question of reducing the saloon license from \$1500 to \$1250 brought forth much talk. In advocating the reduction it was stated that the saloon keepers were up against the "Wilson Relief Fund" in the way of a revenue tax that knocked quite a hole in the profits. In rebuttal it was stated that the size of the whiskey and beer glasses had been reduced in size to meet this emergency. This gentleman evidently was authority on that subject as no one undertook to gainsay. However the council voted to reduce it except Hopkins, who refused to vote.

The finance committee murmured at paying the city marshal fees for arresting Brown, Stevens and Starr for shooting inside the city limits when the Police Judge had remitted the fine. The marshal argued that he had performed his duty even though the police judge failed in his. The acting Mayor asked the judge why he had remitted the fines as it was exceedingly poor business to remit fines and let the city stand for the costs. The Judge blushed and said it was because that they pleaded guilty.

The cement curb on Third street was discussed. A motion was made that a committee be appointed by the acting Mayor to investigate and report the condition. The acting Mayor said that he wanted competent cement men to pass on it so he appointed Mr. Flint, Mr. Grayham and Mr. Lunde.

Wm. Grier presented his resignation which was accepted. In selecting a man to fill his place the question of eligibility was raised. The question was whether it required a councilman to be a freeholder, or simply a tax payer. The city attorney was of the opinion that it was only the Mayor that must be a freeholder. On looking at the charter it was found that it said that they must own property, leaving it rather vague as to the meaning. Phillip Gottfreid was elected.

The city attorney was instructed to proceed with condemnation proceedings on K street. The meeting then adjourned.

A DELICATE HINT

The editor of the Punta Gordia, Fla., Herald is unafraid. In the last number of his paper he comes out flat footed and tells a few of his neighbors "where to get off." His little hint is one that applies to other communities than Punta Gordia alone. Here it is:

"The plan upon which this news paper is run is such that, on the first day of any month, we can suspend publication, refund all advance subscriptions and protect all other liabilities. And that is exactly what we will do whenever the paper fails to pay expenses. We are not such simpletons as to persist in a losing business, and we are not in this business for pleasure, patriotism, and benevolence alone, but for an honest living and a fair proportion of pecuniary profits.

"Those of our business men who do not aid in sustaining this newspaper, by advertising in it, but who claim to be as much devoted as the others to the interests of the town, might as well consider the possibility of a condition arising that would justify The Herald in retiring from business or reducing by getting out a smaller paper. That would be a fine advertisement for the town wouldn't it?

We are gratified to state, however that the paper is paying expenses and we are not contemplating a suspension of the paper or changing the size, but are always ready for it.

The conclusion is, if you think the town should have a newspaper it would be wise in YOU to support it and not leave it to your neighbors to discharge this duty which is indirectly, but really due the community. Always remember that the enterprise and push of a town is judged by its newspaper and a town never rises above them. When you see a shabby newspaper you may safely conclude that there is a lack of enterprise and you pass the town up and seek other fields."

WHO KNOWS OF A CRIPPLED CHILD

An appeal is being made by the Oregon State Federation of Women's Clubs, asking that information be furnished their hospital committee about any crippled children in this county who could be aided by a state-wide organization to furnish free medical treatment of the most modern scientific kind in all cases where the family income is not sufficient for expensive consultations with specialists.

The Federation, which includes a hundred women's clubs in all parts of the state, asks anyone who knows of a little victim of an accident, of spinal meningitis, of infantile paralysis, of tuberculosis in any of the bones or any other crippling cause, to write the details of the case to Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, Secretary of Child Welfare Commission, 250 1/2 Third Street Portland, Oregon.

The club women maintain that these little cripples, besides being most pitiful of all cases of helplessness, and besides being entirely without organized assistance in contrast with the great state institutions which care for the deaf, the blind, the feeble-minded and even delinquents, are also the most curable if treated in time, and the most able when so treated to make good, strong, useful citizens instead of charges on public charity all their lives.
