England seemingly does not think that the United States will fight from the way she has regarded Mr. Bryan's "notes." While Roosevelt was considered somewhat rash in enforcing his demands, a good bluff sometimes beats a fight or a footrace. Bryan is in a position where he will have to engage in one or the other.

While the situation in Mexico needs attention, the common people are not very much enthused with the idea of killing off greasers in order to protect John D's interests. If Uncle Samuel would dispossess some of these old "philanthropists" the trouble would probably cease.

That Col. Roosevelt was right in denouncing the Bryan treaties is becoming more apparent as complications between the allies and American commerce begin to loom up. The treaties bind the United States and each of the nations entering into the treaty to devote a year of inquiry by a commission into the merits of any controversy and during that time to make no addition to her armed forces in preparing for war, but they leave each nation free to arm against other nations. Should England decide to seize all American ships not destined for her ports all the United States could do would be to call an investigation and spend a year in peaceful "watchful waiting" while England and her allies debauch American commerce. If at the end of the year it should become necessary to fight, England will already have her trained soldiers in the field and her navy in fighting trim; but the United States will have only an army of about 25,000 men and no preparations made toward equipment. Verily, verily, Bryan is a great man.
