**Dies of Pneumonia**

Dr. W. B. Officer died of pneu-  
monia Wednesday evening at  
5:00 o'clock at his office over the  
Thompson drug store. The doc-  
tor had been ill only a few days,  
and it was not known that he  
was serious. Tuesday he was  
delirious and came down from his  
office and was going to make his  
regular trip to Dallas, where he  
has an office there, but friends  
persuaded him to go back and go  
to bed. He continued to grow  
worse. His sister, Mrs. Charles  
Hutton of Puyallup, Wash., was  
notified by telegraph, but through  
some error did not get the mes-  
sage until after the doctor was  
dead.

Dr. Officer was 48 years of age  
and was born in Gentry county,  
Mo., Dec. 13, 1867, and grew to  
manhood there. He attended the  
St. Louis Medical College where  
he took a six years course in  
medicine and surgery; graduat-  
ing at the age of 26 years.

After his graduation he visited  
his parents for several weeks and  
then went to Grass Valley, Cali-  
fornia where he practiced his pro-  
fession for several years and  
then removed to Eagle Point,  
California. He next went to  
Portland, Oregon where he prac-  
ticed for two years as a Brain  
Specialist. He came to Falls City  
in 1907 and has resided here ever  
since.

Dr. Officer was a highly edu-  
cated man and a successful and  
skillful physician. At a state  
medical examination he passed  
the highest grade of any prac-  
titioner in Oregon. He was of a  
kind disposition and was always  
ready to help those who were in  
need of the necessities of life.  
His many friends in Falls City  
express their regards in rever-  
ence to the deceased.

The deceased leaves a father  
and mother who reside at Slater,  
Saline county, Mo., and five  
brothers and three sisters: John,  
Franklin, Hurbert and Orville  
Officer who live in the vicinity of  
Slater and Noah Officer who lives  
at Corfu, Wash. Mrs. Ellen  
Campbell and Mrs. Clara Ayres,  
both of Slater; and Mrs. Chas.  
Hutton of Puyallup, Wash.

The body was shipped Thurs-  
day to Dallas where the funeral  
services will be held Sunday at  
10:30 a. m., in the undertaking  
parlors of R. L. Chapman. Rev.  
B. L. Hicks of the Christian  
church of this city will officiate.

Burial will be made in the Odd  
Fellows cemetery. The Moose  
order will have charge of the  
ceremony.
