Monday opened up with another gain in the swine division prices going from 7 85, last weeks top, to 8 05, making an advance of 20c altold. Demand excellent for choice light hogs.

#### Sheep

Sheep market holding firm. Spring lambs are selling at 8 75 to 9 00, ewes 5 50 to 5 75, yearlings 6 75 to 7 00. Packers are still short of supplies.
