While many would rally to the call, yet there would be wide dissatisfaction and a state of anarchy would reign in this country and a crisis be brought about that would shake the nation from centre to circumference.



OR the seeker of amusement there is opportunity a-plenty in the great mechanical achievement, the aeroscope, on the Zone, Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco. The aeroscope is built on the order of a giant crane of a novel and intricate design, with a seating anced, and perfect safety and a jarless ride of ten minutes are assured to passengers who enjoy this trip of 264 feet into the clouds. This is four feet higher than the Ferris wheel. Two motors control the ascent and descent in conjunction with the counterbalance of this huge car, and when it reaches its extreme beight it begins to swing slowly around on the series of wheels at its base, giving the passenger a view of the surrounding country from every point.
