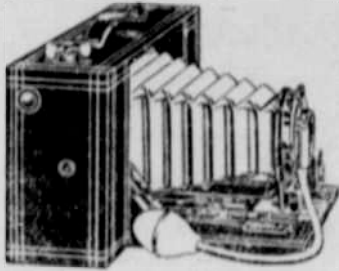

DOG QUARANTINE, RESTRAINING AND MUZZLING ORDER

The infectious and communicable disease known as rabies appears to be spreading in Polk County, and in compliance with Section 3, Chapter 14, Session Laws of 1913,

ORDERS ARE HEREBY GIVEN

That all dogs owned or held within the above named County shall hereafter until otherwise ordered, be either held by chain or muzzled or restrained in such a manner as to prevent their biting anyone or further conveying infection should the disease further develop.

In accordance with Section 29, Chapter 14, Session Laws of 1913, anyone violating this order shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$250.00.

FABLE OF THE AMATEUR POULTRY RAISER

a careful reckoning their owner discovered they cost him four dollars and fifty cents each, to say nothing of seventy-seven hours work and four bitter enemies.
