## Council Meeting

The city council met Tuesday night in an adjourned session from September 7th to conclude some important business with regard to procuring more water and the collection of delinquent street assessments.

The Mayor and all the aldermen were present. It was discovered that C. J. Bradley and Chas. Hopkins had been absent for three consecutive meetings and according to the Charter were automatically removed without any action of the council. They were accordingly re-elected and the business of the evening entered into. The Mayor very forcibly informed them that as a council there was but one course in the collection of the delinquent assessments, and that was to collect them. The city attorney was instructed to proceed without any unnecessary delay to collect all amounts due. The water proposition was discussed and arrangements made to proceed at once to obtain a larger supply of water.

The Council really accomplished more for the good of the town in this one meeting than has been done for many months.

## Corn Specimens

A. H. Dodd brought some fine specimens of corn to the News office Wednesday that he had raised on his farm, one mile and a quarter northeast of Falls City. The corn is of the Flint variety and matures quickly. The ears measured 11-inches long, 6-inches at the small end and 7-inches at the large end, containing 8 fully developed rows on the cob. This is excellent corn and shows what Polk county can produce.

The farmers of this vicinity are requested, if they have samples of farming produce to bring them to this office and place them on exhibition in the office window so that the people of the city can see the progress that the tillers of the soil are making.

## Rev. Hicks Goes to Newberg

Rev. B. L. Hicks left Thursday for Newburg where he will accept the pastorate of the church at that place. The acceptance of his application came as a rather surprise to Rev. Hicks as there were 15 other applications ahead of him, among which was that of an able evangelist and the other was a Portland college professor of 16 years service in the ministry.

Rev. Hicks recently filled the pulpit at the Newberg church during the absence of the pastor, and his strong eloquence won the congregation over in his favor and when his application was brought up it was readily accepted.

Rev. Hicks came here from Madras, central Oregon, one year and three months ago and has been a loyal and faithful worker and the vacancy caused by his resignation will be one that will not be easily filled. The members of the church and the community at large regret to lose Rev. Hicks, but as his new field affords more opportunities and better chances for advancement, they wish him success and a brilliant future, and heartily recommend him to the good people of Newberg as being a noble and trustworthy man.

## SPRING VEAL.

LUNCHEON MENU.  
Bouillon.  
Veal Fritters.

VEAL is at its best in the spring and, though not especially digestible, is served in a great variety of ways. It is a meat which does not keep long. If there is doubt of its freshness it is best to wash it at once, plunge it into boiling water and in ten minutes transfer it to cold water. No other meat is so useful for making soups and gravies.

## Using the Shoulder.

Braised Veal.—Take a piece of shoulder weighing five pounds. Have bone removed and tie up meat to make it firm. Put piece of butter size of half an egg, together with a few shavings of onion, into a kettle and let get hot. Salt and pepper the veal and put into kettle, cover tightly and put over a medium fire until meat is brown on both sides, turning it occasionally. Then set kettle on back of stove, where it will simmer slowly for about two and one-half hours. Before setting meat on back of stove see if the juice of the meat, together with the butter, makes gravy enough and if not add a little hot water. Serve gravy hot with hot meat or cold with cold meat.

## Stuffed Veal.

Roast Fillet of Veal.—Take a thick piece of veal from the upper part of the leg and have the bone removed. Fill the cavity with stuffing made of one cupful of breadcrumbs, moisten with a half cupful of water, one-third of a cupful melted butter, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, a half teaspoonful of powdered thyme and pepper to taste. Tie into a round shape. Dredge with salt, pepper and flour. Put strips of pork over the top and bake. Add water as soon as the flour has browned and baste often. Cover with a paper to prevent burning and allow half an hour to a pound.

## A Dainty For Luncheon.

Veal Fritters.—Take one egg, one and two-thirds cupfuls chopped veal, four tablespoonfuls milk, one-half tablespoonful olive oil, scant half cupful flour, one-eighth teaspoonful salt, white pepper, one-half teaspoonful lemon juice, frying fat. Beat thoroughly the yolk of the egg and add the milk, oil, salt and pepper, flour and lemon juice. Beat the white of the egg stiff and add to the mixture when ready to use. Then stir in the veal, which should not be chopped too fine. Drop with a spoon into slightly smoking fat and fry to a golden brown. Drain on soft paper or cheesecloth. Serve with or without sauce.
