Parent-Teachers Meeting

The Parent-Teachers Association met at the High School building Tuesday night for their regular monthly business meeting. The meeting was opened by an overture by the High School Orchestra, which was followed by a piano solo by Vola Selig, after which President, Mrs. Hopkins, announced that the meeting was open for the discussion of business. In absence of the secretary, Miss Pearl Snedeker, was chosen Secretary, pro tem.

The nomination of officers were taken up and for President, Mrs. Hopkins was unanimously nominated for another term. This makes the 2d term for Mrs. Hopkins, and her interest and untiring attention given to the welfare of the Association and as a compliment to her efforts, another term was given her. For Vice-President, Harry Starr and Mrs. Jesse Moyer were nominated and a vote taken. Count of the votes gave Starr 24, Mrs. Moyer 13 and N. A. Lunde 1. For Secretary R. M. Wonderly was nominated and as there were no further nominations the nominations were declared closed and the secretary cast the ballot by acclamation for R. M. Wonderly.

The following committees were elected: Program committee; Mrs. Ward, Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Sammons. Membership committee; Mrs. Starr, Mrs. Haley, and Mrs. Bradley. Before selecting the committee, Mrs. Hopkins announced that only parents and not teachers would be selected this time for the reason that the teachers had to much work in their classrooms and that the parents had

more time to devote to the duties they were selected for.

There being no further business, Mrs. Hopkins announced that discussions were in order, and that they would be glad to hear from any interested party. Prof. Haley made a short talk on the progress that the school was making and that the progress made this year was better than that of last. On the "Go to School Day", he anticipated a larger and better than was had last year; and that every parent was cordially invited, and that every teacher would be glad to have them come and visit the school, and that if a teacher could not find time to have visitors it was time for her to step down and out. He said that he would soon have a bulletin board and the grades made by the students will be placed on it so that when visiting parents coming to the school can see what progress their children and their neighbor's children are making. The grades last year was graded at 90%, but this year will be graded at 85%. He closed his speech by saying if there was any dissatisfaction caused by the rumors sometimes made on the street for them to come and see for themselves.

No other discussions being made the meeting adjourned to meet the first Tuesday night in December.

After adjournment the office of the Principal was visited and two large maps of the United States and Europe were inspected with close attention and appreciation. The maps were elegantly arranged showing the exact elevation of the land in the mountains and other regions of the two continents.

Those going below 70 percent will be considered failures.
