Pupils will be rated on the following basis according to their ability to study and on their general conduct while at school and at home. First class pupils Saturday and Sunday in Portland those averaging between 95 and returning in time to resume their 100 percent-Second class between 90 and 95 percent-Third class between 85 and 90 percent-Fourth class between 80 and 85 percent-Fifth class between 75 and 80 percent-Sixth class between 70 and 75 percent.
