## FALLS CITY RICH IN MINERALS

University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 25.—Beds of black sand near Falls City contain eight minerals. They are chromite, magnetite, monazite, garnet, olivine, quartz, gold and zircon. The information is contained in a bulletin, "Minerals of Oregon," written by Graham J. Mitchell, assistant professor of geology in the University of Oregon. The bulletin mentions 89 minerals that have been reported to the department of geology as occurring in Oregon, and gives their occurrences as have been reported. The bulletin does not pretend to be exhaustive. A copy may be had free by addressing the registrar, University of Oregon, Eugene.

Chromite is the source of chromium salts and is also used in making hard steel and for making brick to line smelter furnaces in some instances.

Magnetite, which occurs in the black sands of the Pacific coast, is found in the black sand of Falls City. It is an ore of iron strongly attracted by a magnet.

Gold and monazite, the source of thorium from which the welsbach gas mantle is made, are two more.

Garnet crystals which are used for abrasive purposes in finishing wood and leather. Perfect crystals are valuable as museum specimens.

Olivine, which when a clear variety is called peridot, is used as a gem.

Quartz is used for optical instruments. Quartz sand is good for glass-making and as sandstone is good for hones and grinding stones. It is used in electric furnace for making heat-resisting "silica ware."

The last of the minerals listed for Polk county is zircon.

## CANNING FACTORIES

"If all the fruit and vegetables that go to waste each year on American farms could be saved, no doubt several large European armies could be fed for a long time on what is now wasted."

The man speaking was advocating better use of this "waste."

"There is always a surplus of sweet corn, pickles, tomatoes and even pumpkins that in a community that has a canning factory can be easily turned into money," he concluded.

Undoubtedly he is right. Where such factories exist value is added to the surrounding farms, as much more can be obtained per acre from raising such products as peas, tomatoes, berries and fruits of all kinds. Truck-growers, gardeners and farmers then do not need to "take what's to be got" or haul the truck back home. There is always the canning factory to sell to, and such an institution simply must have the goods to make it pay.

Falls City needs such an institution. It's a worth-while industry and its coming should be encouraged.
