**Mayor's Proclamation**

To the Citizens of Falls City: Whereas, a wise custom has been established which calls for a general clean-up day each year in this city; and

Whereas, the time has arrived when we should look to the beautifying of our city by ridding our streets and private inclosures of the trash and rubbish that gathers there in the course of a year's time; and

Whereas, the city council of Falls City has made provisions for the hauling away all rubbish collected on the day hereinafter provided for at the expense of the city; Now, therefore,

I, H. J. Griffin, as Mayor of Falls City, by virtue of the power in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare that Wednesday, the 10th day of May, 1916, shall be and the same hereby is named as a general clean-up day in Falls City, and I request that all citizens unite upon that day to make the event mean to this city all that it is intended to mean. Trash and rubbish collected on that day, if placed in boxes, barrels or sacks on the street next to the curb, will be hauled away by teams employed by the city without expense to the property owners. Anyone having such trash or rubbish to haul will notify the City Marshal.
