Weeping and----!"**
**Beaverton Taxpayer Unloads Upon
The Town Council and Non-Pro-
gressive Citizens**

To the Editor of Beaverton Times:

Anybody can "kick," it takes brains and progressiveism to build up. The writer has both. After sitting on the fence of neutrality for a number of years he finds the policy of "watchful waiting" a failure. Taxpayers have a right to see that the place they are supporting is in a decent condition. Beaverton is a disgrace to modern day life. She is a standing insult to the progressive men and women who have made their home there. Personally I would be miles away if I were not tied down. Young men and women refuse to live here. I have done a man's share in interesting outsiders in this town. They came, looked with disgust and went off on the next car. Now I have given up in despair. What are our mayor and councilmen doing? If they have not funds to improve they are bound by their conscience to keep the property to look after which we voted them in, in a decent condition. They have not done so. The advent of a new councilman is a signal for a new light or a couple up his way to guide his wandering feet thru the dark night. Some of us who live "in town" can't walk up right after dusk, though we be "dry." It costs the city nothing to compel property owners to build new or repair old sidewalks. Refuse is burned on the streets the culprit has plenty of private space. Refuse lies on the streets. Trees line its road for months. Sidewalks are so crooked that a man gets his neck twisted trying to walk when the moon is dark. Ditches are clogged up and stagnant water stands a menace to health and cleanliness. The plumber tears up our roads and where he goeth he who runs (or rides by Ford) may read. If more water mains are tapped on our public property the speed signs can be taken down for travel by auto will be difficult. Pigs thrive in city limits and the odor is awful. We want more publicity in public doings.
