FIRE AT BALDEREE'S CAMP

A fire started at Balderree's camp last Saturday that did a vast amount of damage to the rail road and camp equipment. Lytle, State Veterinarian, Salem, Oregon, asking that such test be made and they are thereby exempted from further requirements of the law until such tests can be made.
