FOOD CONSERVATION

Dallas, Ore., Oct. 6, 1916

Polk County's Food Conservation executive committee met in conference with O. M. Plummer of the State Committee today, and discussed ways and means of conducting the food campaign for food conservation in Polk County.

An advisory committee was appointed, composed of the following representative people of the county: Judge H. H. Belt, Judge E. C. Kirkpatrick, M. Mans-ton, C. W. Beckett, A. B. Local Chairmen were appointed in each community and it was decided to secure the family pledges through the school organization during the week of Oct. 21 to 27. At 10 o'clock a general conference of the advisory committee will be held in the Circuit Court Room followed by a luncheon in the Gail Hotel, given by the Woman's Club and Dallas Commercial Club. Mr. W. V. Fuller will act as toast master and those present will be asked to join in round table talks.

The different fraternal, church, grange, farm union and other organizations are urged to send representatives to this luncheon and to be present at the general meeting at 8 p. m. in the Circuit Court Room.

Collins of the White Sox.

Eddie Collins, star second baseman of the Chicago American league club, is one of the potent reasons why the White Sox are making such a great bid

In December, 1914, Mack sold Eddie to Charles Comiskey for \$50,000, it is alleged, and since then he has been playing the same brilliant ball that he did with the Athletics. Collins was born at Millerton, N. Y., in 1887, and before becoming a professional player on the Columbia university nine. He began his professional career in 1906.

Jimmy Archer Released.

Jimmy Archer, veteran catcher of the Chicago Cubs, has been handed his unconditional release by President Charles Weeghman.

Giants Release Smith.

Pitcher George Smith, formerly of Columbia university, has been turned over by the New York Giants to Rochester of the International league under an optional agreement. He needs further seasoning and may be recalled after the Barrow circuit closes its season.

New Schedule For Internationals.

The International league, through President Ed Barrow, has announced a supplementary schedule of forty-two games for each team to take the place of the Interleague series with the American association, which the latter circuit canceled after all arrangements had been completed. Each team will play twenty-one games at home and the same number on alien fields.

Poultry Must Be Well Fed to Return Profits

To do their best poultry must be given good wholesome food. The prices of the various grains should determine the kind of feed for poultry. Cracked corn appears to be the best and cheapest scratch food. Possibly oats may be fed. For the best results a dry mash should be fed. One hundred pounds each of bran, wheat, middlings and cornmeal, seventy-five pounds of beef scraps and twenty-five pounds of cottonseed have given good results, recommends H. C. Kandel, in charge of poultry extension at the Pennsylvania State college.

If skim milk is available it can be fed very profitably to growing chicks as well as to mature hens. The amount of beef scrap may then be reduced.

A very common practice with many flocks is to feed the same quantity of scratch feed both morning and evening. Better results have been obtained by feeding quite sparingly in the morning and heavily at night. A hen likes to scratch and work for her food. Don't make it too easy for her. Remember activity is the life of the hen.
