WHEN THE WAR WILL END

"Absolute knowledge I have none. Oregon is facing a second Liberty Loan campaign.

This state is required to raise in Liberty Bonds the sum of \$16,500,000 and expected to raise over \$24,000,000.

Those bonds may be bought in any size from \$50 up. They can be bought all cash down or on the partial payment plan—2% down, 18% in 30 days, 40% in 60 days, and 40% 90 days.

Unless the entire country takes up this three billion dollar issue of Liberty Bonds, the country faces one alternative alone. The money will have to be raised by direct taxation, and that means not only income taxes, but every form of taxation that can be devised.

Automobiles and gasoline, for example, as luxuries would probably be taxed until it would be almost impossible to own one.

By purchasing bonds the period of taxation for the war is spread over many years.

Liberty Bonds are exempt from all taxation up to \$5,000.

Over that sum they are exempt from all state and local taxation and are liable only to the surtax.

They are especially a poor man's investment, but the bankers and corporations have already subscribed for millions of dollars of them.

Around the House

When washing stained goods be careful not to dip them in hot suds until they have been treated for the stained spots and washed in clear water. All spots or stains that are uncertain should be rubbed with pure kerosene.

When washing a sweater wash it carefully with some white soap, rinse well and add some bluing to the last water if the garment is white. Then place it in a clean pillowcase and pin the case to the clothesline. When the sweater is nearly dry put it on a coat hanger in the sunshine.

A simple way to bleach handkerchiefs when it is not convenient to hang them out of doors is to wash them and allow them to soak overnight in the water in which a little cream of tartar has been dissolved.

Save the envelopes that have transparent name spaces. Use for buttons, tapes, etc. When in a hurry it will save time to be able to see what each envelope contains.

To keep a kitchen table white wash it first with vinegar and then scrub as usual.

A simple method for buttering bread for sandwiches is to trim off crust on the end of loaf, then butter end of loaf and slice off, and it will not crumble as when sliced before buttering.
