Young Men's Christian Association plans for work in France include the establishment of 78 libraries.

In the United States Armies, November 7, there were 7,815,000 men, in the Navy 271,571, approximately 1,400,000 voluntary enlisted.

Furloughs for Yuletide week will be granted all men at Army cantonments whose absence can be permitted in the opinions of the division commanders, to enable them to spend Christmas at their homes.

Since the war insurance plan became operative in October more than 45,000 soldiers have applied for insurance, amounting in all to nearly half a billion dol-

lars and averaging about \$8,000 a man.

The 1917 potato crop is estimated to consist of 453,000,000 bu., or half again as much as last year. Reports from the commission on car service indicate that more than 750,000 cars will be needed to handle it.

Percentage of Sick in Army Small

Returning from inspection trips to 10 Army and aviation camps, Col. Weston P. Chamberlain of the Surgeon General's Office, reports that the per cent of sick ranges from below 1 per cent to slightly below 2 per cent.

Among the conditions leading to treatment in hospital are severe colds, tonsillitis, slight injuries, and other comparatively slight ailments. About the only serious disease found at any camp was pneumonia.

Each national Army camp has a thousand-bed hospital, equipped in accordance with most approved modern practice.

Supporting Tomato Vines In Home Gardens

The supporting of tomato vines is advisable because the plants produce earlier and better fruit when so treated, says the American Agriculturist. Several methods are used in supporting tomatoes. A common way is to drive a stake about six feet long beside each plant and tie the plant to it. Careful pruning should follow, so that no side branches develop on the one, two or three stalks which are tied to the stakes.

If separate stakes are not used a cheap and effective support for the tomato can be made by placing two large posts in the ground, one at each end of a row, about four feet above the ground. A wire is stretched tightly across the top of the posts, and a common building lath is placed at each plant and firmly tied to the wire at the top.

LEMON SUGAR—IS TAKEN FROM THE YELLOW LEMON, WHICH, AFTER IT BECOMES RIPE, IS KEPT UNTIL THE WINTER. THE JUICE IS SQUEEZED OUT INTO SMALL BOTTLES AND SET OUT IN THE OPEN TO FREEZE. IT IS THEN PACKED AND SHIPPED TO MARKET.

SUGAR OF LEAD—SHOULD NOT BE USED IN TEA, MILK OR COFFEE, BECAUSE OF ITS WEIGHT. JUST THINK OF IT, 16 OUNCES OF SUGAR OF LEAD IS EQUAL TO A POUND OF IRON.

Home Cookery

Peach Flavored Custard.
Boiled custard flavored with peach leaves is delicious. When the custard has reached the boiling point hold a few clean peach leaves in it for a few minutes.

Gooseberry Pudding.
Two cupfuls of gooseberries, two cupfuls of diced stale bread, a cupful and a half of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, a pinch of salt. Remove the blossoms and stems and cut the gooseberries in halves. Brush a baking dish with butter and put alternate layers of bread, berries and sugar—three of bread and two of berries and sugar. Put butter on top, cover and steam for an hour. Uncover and put in a moderate oven for an hour.

Hash Croquettes.
Two cupfuls of ground meats, a small onion, a tablespoonful of powdered sage, a tablespoonful of fine breadcrumbs, two eggs well beaten and salt and pepper to season. Mix all together well, if too dry add a few drops of sweet milk. Mold into cakes, roll in flour and fry in deep hot fat. Drain and serve at once.

Peach Cake.
Cream one cup of sugar and one rounding tablespoon of shortening, add yolk of one egg, one-half cup of milk and one-half cup of water (the water makes it much fluffier), two teaspoons of baking powder, a very little vanilla and enough sifted flour to make a moderately thin batter. Stir good and bake in layers in quick oven. Put together with the following: White of one egg, unbeaten; one cup of sugar and the pulp of one good sized, mellow peach. Beat fifteen minutes.

Biscuits Without Shortening.
Into two cupfuls of buttermilk put half a teaspoonful of soda, beat till light and foamy, add half a teaspoonful of salt, a quart of flour, a teaspoonful of baking powder, sifting all together. Mix with a spoon, put on floured board, roll out and cut. Bake in a moderate oven twenty to twenty-five minutes.
