Parcel post for the American Expeditionary Forces in France will not be accepted for mailing UNLESS

1. The articles to be mailed are requested in writing, by the soldier, and the request approved by his commanding officer or superior official.
2. The parcel marked:—"This parcel contains only articles sent at approved request of addressee which is inclosed."
3. The written request must be inclosed in the parcel, as it will not be sent to France.
