GETS BIG SHIP ORDER

Vessels Are for Private Parties and Will Cost \$20,000,000.

Washington, D. C. - The Shipping Board has granted permission to Harry B. Spear, president of the West Coast Shipbuilding company, of Everett, Wash., to enter upon the construction of approximately \$20,000,000 worth of concrete ships for private account, and

guaranteed to insure delivery of all steel required for reinforcement. Specifically, this company is author-ized to build 10 cargo carriers of 7500 tons each; 20 barges of 200 tons each, and eight seagoing tugs each 200 feet long. In the building of these ships 15,000 tons of steel reinforcement will be required.




