THE SUCCESSFUL BUSINESS MAN

A Notable Statue.

In the beautiful city of Buenos Aires is perhaps the only statue in the world erected by white men to a negro. This is the statue of Falucho, a negro soldier who refused to haul down the Argentine flag at the bidding of the Spanish soldiery during the first Argentine revolution and was shot down by the Spanish.

HISTORIC CHOTIN.

This Battle Torn Town Spells Its Name Six Different Ways.

"Only a few miles east of the Austro-Russian boundary line, on the right bank of the Dniester, is the Bessarabian town of Chotin, which enjoys the perplexing distinction of having six correct ways of spelling its name—Chotin, Khotin, Khochim, Choczim, Chocim and Khoteev," says a National Geographic society bulletin.

"For more than two centuries the tides of conflict between Poles and Turks, Austrians and Turks, Austrians and Russians, and Russians and Turks swirled and eddied about this town. It was here, in 1621, that the grand betman, Chodkiewicz, one of the greatest soldiers the Polish nation ever produced, fought his last great battle. With a small army he entrenched himself at Chotin and withstood 160,000 Turks under the personal command of the Sultan Osman until the snow forced the invaders to retire. The victory was dearly bought, however, for a few days after the enemy raised the siege Chodkiewicz died in the fortress as a result of exposure.

"More than a century later (1739) Chotin was again the scene of a triumph over the Turks, this time the Moslems' opponents being a Russian army under Count Munnich, famous in Slavic military annals as the founder of the cadet corps from which future Russian armies were to secure their trained officers.

"It was at this battle of Chotin that Munnich had among his subordinates two young Austrians, who a few years later were to become noted field marshals in the service of Maria Theresa—Ernst Gideon Loudon, who was to defeat Frederick the Great on several important battlefields, and Franz Moritz Lacy, who with Daun played a Fabian game against the Prussian king. The name of Munnich is still revered by Russian soldiers, and the Thirty-seventh dragoons bear his name.

"Chotin was captured by the Russians in 1769, by the Austrians in 1788, and reoccupied by the Russians in 1806. It finally passed to the latter nation with the rest of Bessarabia by the peace of Bukarest in 1812.

"Among the ancient landmarks still standing in Chotin is a crumbling Italian fort, memento of the days when the Genoese had a colony and trading post there."

Tin Cook Pots.

Tin is the least important of the six useful metals. It is also inferior in many ways to the others in this group of elements, but is tougher than lead and will make a better wire, though not a really good one. It has a whiteness and a luster that are not tarnished by ordinary temperature and is cheap. That is why it is used in making cooking utensils, pans, etc., and for roofs. But the pans, roofs, etc., are not pure tin. They are thin sheets of iron coated with tin. Pure tin would not be strong enough for these purposes, so a sheet of iron is first taken to supply the strength and then covered with tin to improve the appearance of the tin pans and keep them from rusting rapidly.

Who Are the Sane?

If the definition of insanity was followed to the letter, were experts appointed to examine all men, few would escape the brand of insanity, but who could qualify as an expert since we may become insane upon the subject of insanity? All have their predilections and prejudices, symptoms of a mild form of mental bias, passing under the ambiguous name of eccentricities, and some there are so erratic that we should call them insane did they not possess sufficient sanity to dissemble their weakness.—Medical Fortnightly.

Among the Hopi girls of marriageable age signify their willingness for matrimony by doing their hair up in whorls, one over each ear. In the symbolism of the tribe these whorls represent the blossoms of the squash vine. These whorls are taken down at marriage, and thereafter the matron wears her hair in two rolls, one hanging down each side of her face. These rolls are said to represent the fruit of the squash.—Christian Herald.

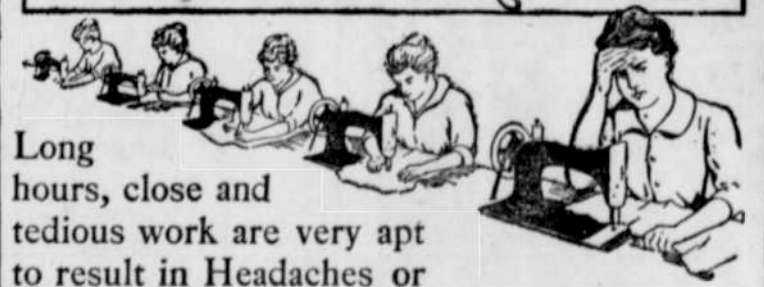
