Raspberry Jam Without Berries.

The dairy and food commission of Minnesota, has given out for publication a receipt for the manufacture of jam exposing the method of unscrupulous manufacturers of imitation fruit preserves. The exposure reads as follows:

"I have seen raspberry jam made in large quantities from the following ingredients: The base of this jam was apple parings and cores as prepared and packed in barrels by apple evaporators. These parings and cores were first placed in huge copper steam kettles with sufficient water and glucose, the latter for sweetening, and boiled until the mass was thoroughly cooked. Then it was strained through filtering material to make a clear syrup.

Next a quantity of aniline dye, a coal tar product, was stirred in for color; then a quantity of timothy grass seed to imitate raspberry seeds, (and we'll have to admit that the resemblance was close enough to deceive an expert) was incorporated into the mass and finally a flavoring extract was added. The label said: 'Pure Raspberry Jam, made from the finest quality of Fresh Fruit.'"—Ex.
