The city council met pursuant to adjournment in regular session on Wednesday evening. Present: Councilmen Dayenport, Johnson, Kerr and Burns, the Mayor, Recorder and Marshal.

Minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

The regular monthly reports for June of the recorder and marshal were read and referred to the finance committee.

In the matter of the application of Bert Seal and others for water for calinary and irrigating purposes, the matter was discussed and referred to a street committee with orders to examine and report at next meeting.

A petition was received from S. J. Tuttle, praying for the abatement of a public nuisance at the intersection of Front and hall street parts adjacent, which was read and referred to special committee consisting of Councilmen Kerr, Johnson and Davenport, to investigate and report at a future meeting.

PARKER NOMINATED.

St. Louis, July 9.—After an all-night session Judge Alton B. Parker, of New York, was nominated for president, at 5:30 o'clock this morning by the national democratic convention. The nomination was made on the first ballot. At the completion of the roll call of the states Parker had a total of 658 votes, or nine less than the necessary two-thirds of the convention. Before the vote was announced, Idaho changed their votes to Parker, and West Virginia added three more, assuring his nomination. Washington then changed from Hearst to Parker and this was followed by a motion from Congressman Champ Clark to make the nomination unanimous. A mighty cheer went up, the band struck up the "Star Spangled Banner," and a monstrous American flag was unfurled from the dome of the building.

The vote of the Oregon delegation stood, Parker 4, Hearst 2, McClelland 1, Coler 1. Adjourned until 2 p. m.
The convention re-assembled and was called to order at 2:48 p. m., but owing to the heat another adjournment was taken until 5 o'clock when a vice-presidential nomination will be made.
