Helps Indian War Veterans.

Coquille, Ore., July 1.—(To the Editor.)—Many of the Indian War Veterans of 1855-6, or their heirs in Oregon owe a debt of gratitude they cannot easily repay to the press of the state for the kind manner in which they have responded to my requests for space to notify the many who have, or did have on August 31, 1903, sums of money in various amounts due them at Washington. A list of these, 635 in all, was published in the Morning Oregonian August 31, 1903, sanctioned by Adjutant-General C. U. Gantenbein. This money due is wages unclaimed by the veterans at the time of their discharge.

Many more pensions will be granted when these sums are called for. If the veterans are dead the heirs can obtain the money. I am not a claim agent and do not promise to obtain this money or their pensions for those entitled to the same, but simply to instruct those who desire me to do so how I obtained mine at little or no expense and in a speedy manner. To quote from the Government's notice: "The Government especially insists that the services of an attorney are not needed, but application should be made direct to the Auditor of the War Department at Washington."

I have a list of the names and have corresponded with many persons since the list was published and have not yet found a single person who was aware of these sums. If postage is enclosed I will make no charge unless I can be of further assistance. If the veteran's record is desired I shall charge a small sum for my services. My desire is to help those who cannot help themselves. This money is due those who served in the Rogue River War and the Yakima War. Nearly half a century has passed since that time and it is not strange that it is forgotten. Yours to do good,
