Great Strike.

CHICAGO, July 12.—Without waiting until the hour set for the general strike of the 49,600 employees in the nine principal meat-packing centers of the country, beef-cutters at the stockyards here quit work considerable ahead of the time expected. A dispute over wages of the unskilled laborers precipitated the trouble. When the contracts expired last May, the packers understood to reduce the wages of the unskilled men to 17½ cents per hour, and the union insisted that it should remain 18½ cents. Last Friday the union was notified that the packers had no concession to make and the strike was at once declared.

St. Joseph, Mo., July 12.—More than 5000 employees of Swift & Co., Nelson, Morris & Co. and the Hammond Packing Company in South Joseph went out on a strike at noon today and the plants have closed down. The strikers are orderly and there has been no attempt at demonstration of any kind.

About 700 men employed in the yards of the packing houses and many yards of the packing house and many employed by the Stock Yards Company are thrown out by the strike.

East St. Louis, Ill., July 12.—At noon today more than 5000 butchers and cutters employed by the packing houses here stopped work. The men quit work very quietly and there was no disturbance when they left the stock yards.

Sioux City, Iowa, July 12.—About 1000 men in the Cudahy packing plant here obeyed the order to strike. The plant was forced to shut down. Business at the stockyards is at a stand-still as a result.

St. Paul, Minn., July 12.—Unless notified from Chicago that an agreement has been reached, the butchers and meatcutters, including the girls employed by Swift & Co., numbering nearly 1000 persons will go on a strike at noon today.

Kansas City, Mo., July 12.—Eight thousand meatcutters, butchers affiliated with the Amalgamated Meatcutters' and Butcher Workmen's Union, constituting the entire forces in these departments in the six big packing plants here, struck today. As a result all the plants are shut down and 12,800 employees in the various departments are affected.

Omaha, Neb., July 12.—At noon today 4000 employees of the four packing houses at South Omaha laid down their tools and went out on a strike.
