Die Together.

One of the most shocking tragedies that ever occurred in Douglas County was given in evidence Tuesday morning when the dead bodies of Wm. Ford, a middle aged man, and Emily Bogard, the sixteen-year-old step-daughter of A. H. Churchill, were found in the Umpqua river near Millwood, 25 miles northwest of Roseburg. So far as known there were no eye witnesses to the tragedy and to all appearances it seems like a case of double suicide, although there are some who doubt that the girl's death was of her own volition. From the fact that Ford, although a married man, seemed to be infatuated with the girl, who apparently encouraged his attentions, the suicide is self-explanatory. Besides a wife, Ford leaves four children, the eldest of whom is only six years of age. They resided on what is known as the sheep ranch, five miles down the river from Millwood. The girl's parents are highly respected residents of Millwood.

Just how long the feeling of mutual affection had existed between Ford and the girl is not known, but their affairs did not come to the knowledge of the girl's parents until the couple attempted to elope on the morning of their death. Mr. Churchill phoned to Sheriff McClallen at Roseburg, telling him of the elopement and asking him to come immediately and arrest Ford. Sheriff McClallen informed Churchill that he would have to come to Roseburg and swear out a warrant first, whereupon Mr. Churchill promised to do so. Nothing more of the matter reached Sheriff McClallen until about four o'clock in the afternoon, when a telephone message from Millwood announced that the bodies of the couple had been found in the river.

Further inquiry brought out the information that parties from Millwood started out to trace the eloping couple and came upon their bodies as they were crossing the river three miles below Millwood. Coroner Twitchell went to Millwood today to hold an inquest. He was accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Y. L. Bogard, who, by the way, is an uncle of the dead girl. Additional facts will be made known as soon as the officials return.—Roseburg Review.

Two-Fifths of the Population Work.

Washington, July 13.—A special report of the Census Bureau on occupations shows that in Continental United States the total number of persons engaged in gainful occupations in 1900 was 29,073,235, which was one-half of the population 10 years of age and over, and nearly two fifths of the entire population. The total number comprises 22,589,525 men, 4,833,630 women and 1,264,411 were boys and 485,765 girls. Those of foreign birth aggregate 5,851,399, or one-fifth of the total number of the gainful workers, and the statistics show that the emigration of 20 years has not increased the population of foreign born in the working population of the country.

Those of foreign parentage aggregate 11,166,361, or over 38 per cent, almost equally divided between immigrants and children of immigrants. Manufacturing, trade and transportation and the professions show an increasing number of workers of each sex, while the agricultural class represents a diminishing proportion.
