Corvallis, Oregon, July 18.—William Bailey of Fairmount, aged 72, and Mrs. Sarah Edlemann, of Corvallis, aged 70, were married here Friday by Rev. T. T. Vincent, County Recorder. The contracting parties had never met till a week before the wedding. The unusual sudden marriage is the result of the good offices of a mutual friend. The latter while calling upon the bride in her home in Corvallis last week, remarked:

"You have a comfortable home here, and could well afford to share it with another."

Yes, there is plenty of room for two," was the arch reply.

The next day the mutual friend mentioned the subject of marriage to the groom, telling him of an estimable lady, who had a happy home and was not averse to sharing it with another.

"Barkis was willin'," a meeting followed, and Friday the groom returned, a license was secured and the ceremony performed. Both are living happily now in Job's Addition. A party of small boys, who gave the newly wedded couple an old-fashioned charivari last evening, were called into the house, treated to cake and pie and sent on their way rejoicing.

In Several Strike Centers.

Chicago July 22—Fully 8500 employees applied to re-employment. All stood together. Riots become quite frequent after nightfall.

Kansas City—Both sides are greatly surprised, but men promptly walk out. Some disorder follows.

Fort Worth—Men had voted to strike rather than work with non-union men before Donnelly wired.

St. Joseph—Union employees promptly obey strike order. Several nonunionists are sought out and severely beaten.

Omaha—Many of strikebreakers having left, packers are placed in an awkward position.

St. Louis—Plants are completely tied up.

Bloody Night's Shooting.

Bonesteel, July 24—As a result of a wild night's shooting and rounding up of grafters, two policemen were shot.

The police began the round up of the gamblers and crooks, who backed slowly to the railroad tracks where they made a stand. Two hundred shot were fired, and 12 men were wounded.

Forty-five prisoners are held in the stock yards, guarded by a hundred men. There is fear of a bloody riot.

Two More Steamers Seized.

St. Petersburg, July 23—It is announced that advices have been received that the captain of the steamer Petersburg that seized the Malacca had seized two more steamers in the Red sea carrying contraband.

London, July 23—It is reported in Stock Exchange circles that the contraband discovered aboard the Malacca was shipped at Antwerp, marked sugar.
