Good Mining Prospects.

The following was gained by a Telegram reporter from G. H. Kilm while that gentleman was in Portland recently:

"I feel satisfied that some very good properties will sometime be opened up there, and believe the end of Dave Briggs, which has been causing so much excitement, will prove lasting.

"People in that locality, however, are not included to be excited over the find. There have been several very rich pockets of free gold discovered in that locality in the past, and it is a common opinion there that the new find is but another of these pockets.

"But I do not think the people in that vicinity generally know much about quartz mining. They are placer miners, as a rule, and have had little experience with quartz. While they may be right in their estimate of the new find, it cannot be denied that there is much gold in that country, and prospects for the discovery and development of good mines are promising.

"There are a great many prospectors on the ground, and more are continually coming, but they do not remain in the vicinity of the new find, and are soon lost in the wild country that borders it. The statement that all of the land is staked off is not true, for as far as the eye can see there is good prospecting country."

Indians and Cowboys Fight.

Helena, Mont., July 26.—William Brown, a half-breed, Aloysius Chandler, an Indian, an unknown cowboy and unknown Indian are dead and several Indians and cowboys are seriously wounded as a result of a battle at Rocky Point, in the Belknap Indian reservation.

The news was received at the agency last night by a messenger that a band of Indians, en route to the Crow reservation, stopped at Rocky Point, where they met a band of cowboys. Poker and freewater caused a quarrel. The half-breed, Brown, struck a cowboy. The latter shot him and a battle followed.

Both sides finally withdrew. Several Indians were badly wounded, and two cowboys were supported to their saddles by comrades.

Major Logan with a detachment of soldiers in pursuit of the cowboys and Indians. The cowboys swam the Missouri river and made their escape. They are now in the Bad Lands.

Leading Events of the Twenty Third Week of the War.

July 17th.—In the last engagement before Port Arthur, the Russian official report shows that the Slavs lost over 5,500 men in killed and wounded.

July 18th.—Russians capture and tow into Port Arthur the dispatch boat "Fawan" belonging to the Chicago Daily News.

General Rennenkampf of the Russian army is slightly wounded in the engagement in which his army defeated with a loss of 5,500 men.

The latest report from Niu Chuang states that the Russians are completely surrounded by Japanese below Mukden.

July 19th.—Great Britain sends a fleet of fast cruisers to the Red Sea to stop a further Russian raid on British merchant marines. Germany also sends two crack cruisers to the Red Sea to demand of Russia an immediate release of her merchantman which was captured by Russians.

July 20.—The Russian loss in the battle of Mo Tien Pass is reported to have been 1,000 in killed and wounded.

Vladivostok squadron is out on the Pacific and is expected to menace the coast of Japan.

Russian Vladivostok squadron sieze another British squadron.

July 21st.—Reinforcement for General Oku is being disembarked on the coast of Liao Tung peninsula, a decisive battle near Port Arthur is soon expected.

Steamer Manchuria with members of Japanese Diet, foreign military attaches and newspaper correspondents visits the Admiral Togo's flagship "Mikasa" and are cordially received.

July 22nd.—After a series of complicated maneuvers the Japanese break through the line of General Kuropatkin and begin their march onto Mukden, capital of Manchuria and the Russian base of operations. The Russian position becomes almost untenable.

July 23rd.—Japanese rout the Russians under General Keller. The former loses 380 men and officers while the loss of Russians are reported more than three times that number.

July 24th.—The Russians and Japanese meet and engage in a battle lasting nearly 24 hours, at Ta Che Kiao. The Russians are finally driven back from their position with a considerable loss. The evacuation of Niu Chuang by the Russians are almost inevitable.

Russian Vladivostok squadron sinks another neutral steamer from New York, near the coast of Izu, Japan.

Discovered Mineral Springs.

Hans Ingulfsson has discovered a spring near Old North Bend which proves to be strongly impregnated with sulphur and other healthful mineral ingredients. The water will be analyzed and further prospecting done before the value of the find can be estimated.—North Bend Evening Post.
