

Council Proceedings.

The common council met in special session on the 22nd ult, and was called to order at 8 o'clock p. m., His Hon. J. J. Stanley, mayor, in the chair.

Present, Councilmen Burns, Davenport, Johnson, Kerr, and Lorenz, His Hon., the mayor, the city Recorder and marshal.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

In the matter of opening "B" street (near the academy) across the Agee property, between Second and Watkins streets, Nosler's Addition, Messrs J. F. Schroeder, J. J. Lamb and A. A. Leach were named and confirmed as appraisers to be held as per published notice.

Special committee on the abatement of nuisances at and about the intersection of Hall and Front streets, recommending that the trash thereabouts be cleaned up and burned.

Recommendation approved.

In the matter of opening and improving street to the depot, Mr. A. J. Collier being present, the subject was discussed at some length, which culminated in the council's resolving itself into a committee of the whole, to visit and inspect the grounds with Mr. Collier and report at a future meeting.

Surveyor A. S. Gould's report on the improvement of Second street (old town plat) between "B" and "C" streets was received, read and adopted, and his bill for said work—\$6.00, ordered paid.

The City Recorder was directed to publish notices, relative to the opening of "B" street, Nosler's addition, and for writing proposals for filling and grading Second street, "old town plat."

The ever present matter of "side walks" coming up again for consideration, the city marshal was instructed to make a list of such walks as were in urgent need of repairing or rebuilding and report at the next meeting of the council. Mr. O. C. Sanford representing the school board being present, kindly volunteered to assist in making said list.

Another Accident.

Alva Thrush, employed on the Higgins' ranch where J. E. Fitzgerald met with such a horrible accident last Tuesday morning, was brought to town in almost the same predicament yesterday afternoon. Though his injuries are not so serious as were those of his employer it is a remarkable coincidence that they are of exactly the same nature and that the accident occurred at the very spot which marks the scene of the other, not yet a week old.

When Mr. Fitzgerald was hurt he fell from the top of his barn where he was putting up a pulley he used in hauling hay into the loft. When Thrush was injured he was at work putting the hay into the loft and stood at the very spot where Fitzgerald had fallen. The same pulley which Fitzgerald was hanging is the pulley which dropped with such disastrous results to Mr. Thrush yesterday afternoon.

Just how either accident occurred is not exactly known. It is simply known that the block fell striking Mr. Thrush upon the head inflicting a very ugly scalp wound and denting the skull. He was brought to town late yesterday evening and is now at the hospital where his wounds have been dressed and he is under the care of Dr. Horsfall. Mail.
