## Council Proceedings.

**Regular Meeting.**  
Council met in regular session on the 1st, inst., and were called to order at 8 o'clock p. m., His Hon. J. J. Stanley, mayor, in the chair. Present at roll call: Councilmen Burns, Davenport, Johnson, Kerr and Lorenz, His Hon. the mayor, the city Recorder and Marshal.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.  
The monthly reports of the city Recorder, Treasurer and Marshal were read and referred to Finance Committee. Also under this head the Marshal filed a report on defective and worn out side walks, comprising 1720 feet belonging to twenty-one owners, as well as about 300 feet of cross walks in urgent need of repairing or rebuilding.  
Committee of the whole council on Depot street opening not having formulated a satisfactory report, the matter was laid over to a future meeting.

Rev. Mr. Myers, water rates, remitted until Sept. 15, '04, in view of the fact that he had paid full rates for two years and had used the water but half the time, being absent.

New water connections were applied for by Messrs Kerrigan, Russ Johnson and Doc Woods, all of which were referred to the marshal, (water supt.) with implied instructions to place these parties on the paying list as soon as possible.

Marshal Goodman filed the appointment of A. A. Leach to be Night Watchman; vice. W. W. Gage, resigned. Appointment approved and \$10.00 per month fixed as the part of his salary to be paid by city.

The C. B., R. & E. R. Co., asked permission to remove the planking between the rails of their track through the city and fill same with crushed rock and gravel.

Permission granted, conditioned that the work be done in a substantial manner and in such a way as not to impede the ordinary business of the street.

The Marshal's report on dangerous and defective side walks was taken up and the Mayor requested to have an ordinance prepared covering the entire report, making the expense of repairs, etc., a lien upon the lots, unless such repairs are made by owners after ratification by the proper officer, to repair or rebuild the same and report said ordinance at the next meeting.

The ordinance was adopted and approved; fixing theatrical and show license at from \$5.00 to \$25.00 per day with penalties of from \$25.00 to \$100.00 or not more than fifty days in the city jail for any violation of the same. Said ordinance repeals all former ordinances touching this subject.

At 10:40 p. m., council adjourned.

## Leading Events of the Twenty-Fourth Week of the War.

July 25:—Russian Vladivostok squadron is sighted 70 miles South of Yokohama harbor.

July 26:—For fourteen hours the Japanese and Russians engage in a fierce battle on the pass of Ta Tche Kino. The Russians are finally driven back with a loss of 10,000 men in killed and wounded. Two Russian general are killed and the commander-in-chief general Kurapatkin is among the wounded.

July 27:—Russians evacuate the town of New Chuang and the garri- sons are occupied by the Japanese.

July 28:—A division of Japanese torpedo boats creep into the harbor of Port Arthur and hidden in the dense fog discharges several torpedoes at the Russian flotilla of de- structors. Three Russian torpedo- boat destroyers, including the "Lieut-

tenant Burukoff," the latest models of the class, are totally destroyed. The Japanese escape without any injury.

July 29:—The advance post of the Japanese army is reported to be within 10 miles of Mukden, the Russian base of operations.

July 30:—The Vladivostok squadron cleverly evades the Japanese ships and returns to the harbor.

Three Japanese armies, under the generals, Oku, Kuroki and Nodzu, completely outmaneuver and envelop the Russian main army.

General Kurapatkin must either immediately retreat or accept a battle which may result in a total defeat of the Russians.

July 31st:—Japanese attack and capture several outer Forts at Port Arthur.

Aug 1st:—A considerable number of Japanese are landed at Yin Kow under the cover of several warships.

Aug. 2nd:—General Kuroki reports that the Japanese have occupied Yung Sue Pass after a brief fight with the Russians. The pass is situated about 25 miles east of Liao Yang and is a key to the defence of Mukden road.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

The County Court of Coos County Oregon, will receive proposals to build a wing to the Hoffman bridge on Middle Fork of Coquille river until 2 o'clock p. m., Saturday the 20th day of August, 1904.

Said wing to be constructed in the following manner, to-wit: Beginning at the East end of the pier of said bridge on the South side of said river, running in a South-Easterly direction 344 feet to an alder tree marked "X," near the top of bank, the piling to be of white cedar not less than 7 inches in diameter at the small end, to be driven 8 feet apart and at least 3 feet below the river bed, the piles to be capped on a level with pier of said bridge, with 8x10 inch caps and planked with 2x12 inch planks, said planks to be spiked to piles with 60 d spikes in end of each plank where same rests on pile, the space between planks not to exceed 2 inches. The wing to be braced by piles driven near the bank on the South side of wing and 16 feet apart, a brace running from same at the ground to piling in wing near the top of piling in wing and to be notched so that half the brace will rest against the pile and securely spiked and all material used to be of good, sound merchantable timber.

The contractor to furnish all material and labor necessary to be used in the construction of said wing. All work to be done in a good and workman-like manner and under the supervision of the County Court of Coos county, Oregon, or one of the members thereof. Each bidder will be required to deposit with his bid five per cent of the amount of his bid, which shall be forfeited to the County in case the award is made to him; if he fails or refuses, for the period of two days after such award is made, to enter into contract and file his bond in the manner required by law and to the satisfaction of the County Court upon the day appointed.

The County Court reserves the right to reject any and all bids. All bids should be filed with the County Clerk on or before the time specified.
