NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

The County Court of Coos County Oregon, will receive proposals to build a wing to the Hoffman bridge on Middle Fork of Coquille river until 2 o'clock p. m., Saturday the 20th day of August, 1904.

Said wing to be constructed in the following manner, to-wit: Beginning at the East end of the pier of said bridge on the South side of said river, running in a South-Easterly direction 344 feet to an alder tree marked "X," near the top of bank, the piling to be of white cedar not less than 7 inches in diameter at the small end, to be driven 8 feet apart and at least 3 feet below the river bed, the piles to be capped on a level with pier of said bridge, with 8x10 inch caps and planked with 2x12 inch planks, said planks to be spiked to piles with 60 d spikes in end of each plank where same rests on pile, the space between planks not to exceed 2 inches.

The contractor to furnish all material and labor necessary to be used in the construction of said wing. All work to be done in a good and workman-like manner and under the supervision of the County Court of Coos county, Oregon, or one of the members thereof. Each bidder will be required to deposit with his bid five per cent of the amount of his bid, which shall be forfeited to the County in case the award is made to him, if he fails or refuses, for the period of two days after such award is made, to enter into contract and file his bond in the manner required by law and to the satisfaction of the County Court upon the day appointed.
