Leading Events of the Twenty-Sixth Week of the War.

August 3rd.—General Kuroki reports that on July 31st and August 1st, his army had two distinct engagements simultaneously with the Russians near Liao Yang, and that in both cases he has driven the enemy back after severe fighting. The temperature was nearly 120 degrees and several cases of sunstroke are reported. The official figure shows the Japanese loss to be nearly 1,000, including 682 wounded. The Russian official figures show their loss to be not over 4,000, including 38 officers. The Russians also lost six field pieces, much ammunition, and military stores. General Keller is among the dead. Japanese capture the city of Niu Chwang and hoist their flag over the building of the Russo-Chinese Bank. They also confiscate gold amounting to \$25,000,000 belonging to the bank.

August 4th.—Port Arthur fleet appears off the harbor and after a brief engagement with the blockading Japanese, retires into the inner basin.

The crew of the Russian gunboat "Sivouch" which has been at anchor in the Liao river, blows up the ship and escapes fearing the capture of the warship by the Japanese.

August 5th.—General Kuropatkin is madly engaged in extricating himself and his army from the fast maneuvering Japanese who are already in his rear left and right. The situation of Kuropatkin is considered almost untenable.

August 6th.—Refugees from Port Arthur state the condition of the garrison as very discouraging and almost hopeless against the fearless Japanese, who are using more than 380 siege guns against the forts.

August 7th.—The latest report from the Russian sources states that the Japanese attacking forces before Port Arthur have lost 10,000 men in killed and wounded during the several engagements which have taken place there.

August 8th.—The Japanese army besieging Port Arthur capture several commanding positions including the Wolf and Tiger Hills.

August 9th.—The London Post's correspondent reports that the defenders at Port Arthur are pressed hard. Ammunitions and provisions are running low and that the commanding general, Stoessel, has committed suicide.

Lecturer Coming.

As a closing entertainment for the teachers' institute to be held here next week, Prof. Frederick W. Carstens has been secured to deliver his famous lecture, "Beyond the Alps Lies Italy." The Professor is a lecture of renown and this is one of his best efforts. His home is at Medford but he spends most of his time in the lecture field and has just returned from a trip through Illinois and neighboring states. Besides the lecture, literary features will be introduced and an admission fee of 25 cents will be charged to help defray the expenses of the institute. Don't miss this lecture.

East Fork Items.

F. A. Pierson, who recently closed a five-months' school in district No. 32, has moved to Myrtle Point. Mr. Pierson is a good teacher, one for whom pupils do good work. Five of the class which reviewed the eighth grade work passed, two in the May examination and three in the June.

Games, recitations and songs were the features of the enjoyable entertainment given by the school the night of the last day.

The Coos Bay stage line has a heavy passenger traffic these days. Some of the Brewster valley people are outing at Bandon.

Geo. Folsom has returned from a trip to Portland. He thinks Coos is ahead of the Willamette valley.

The 14th annual reunion of the Coos County Pioneer and Historical Society will take place at North Bend on August 15th. All needed preparations are being made for a grand time. All who can should make it a point to be there.

The County Court of Coos County Oregon, will receive proposals to build a wing to the Hoffman bridge on Middle Fork of Coquille river until 2 o'clock p. m., Saturday the 20th day of August, 1904.

Said wing to be constructed in the following manner, to-wit: Beginning at the East end of the pier of said bridge on the South side of said river, running in a South-Easterly direction 344 feet to an alder tree marked "X," near the top of bank, the piling to be of white cedar not less than 7 inches in diameter at the small end, to be driven 8 feet apart and at least 3 feet below the river bed, the piles to be capped on a level with pier of said bridge, with 8x10 inch caps and planked with 2x12 inch planks, said planks to be spiked to piles with 60 d spikes in end of each plank where same rests on pile, the space between planks not to exceed 2 inches.
