Late War News.

Tokio, Aug. 30.—The Japanese casualties in the battle of Amping, were two thousand killed and wounded, and 16 Russian guns were captured.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 30.—A telegram from Sakharoff received here at 10 o'clock this morning states that the Japanese are advancing along the whole front. The main attack is being directed toward the center and right where the Russian have been heaviest.

Liao Yang, Aug. 30.—The Japanese resumed the artillery duel with the Russians this morning, the heaviest firing is in the south and has been almost continuous. Japanese are searching the whole Russian front. The Mikado's forces mass all their guns for few moments on one square and then train them to another with mathematical precision.

London, Aug. 30.—The Die Post prints a Liao Yang dispatch stating that two divisions of Japanese had turned Kuropatkin's left flank and attained a position between Liao Yang and Mukden, thus cutting off Kuropatkin's retreat.

London, Aug. 30.—The Exchange telegraphs St. Petersburg that the general staff after hearing Kuroki had cut off the Russian retreat to Mukden expresses an opinion that Liao Yang will become another Port Arthur. The fortifications there are splendid and provisions plentiful.

London, Aug. 30.—A Central News Paris, dispatch says two Russian vessels of the Baltic fleet and reported seriously damaged during gunners practice, while on the third boat a cannon exploded killing the commander and 30 men.
