A New York syndicate has bought 5,000 acres of land in the Adirondack wilderness for a club and reserve.

Old home week reunions are all the rage in New England. In New Hampshire alone twenty towns have recently indulged in these local celebrations.

Colorado, on account of the insurrection within its borders, will be called upon to pay about one million of dollars for losses and expenses.

The banking house in Oklahoma, which was awarded all the bonds for the Philippine issue, has transferred them to a New York city house. The two bids were nearly equal.

Hereafter Vermont marbles are to be cut by electricity. A 3,000-horsepower plant is being installed in one of the great quarries. The continued strikes compel employers to find some substitute for manual labor.

Europe has this year experienced the hottest and driest summer of a decade. In France, Germany and Austria there has been tropical heat, with vegetation in a deplorable condition.

Chicago is to have a Union Labor bank, with a capital of \$200,000. There's not much in a name, but it is to be hoped the depositors will not conclude to strike because some non-union man patronizes the bank.

As the campaign progresses issue after issue disappears, and the great remaining question is, who is the better looking, Parker or Roosevelt? This is all a matter of taste. Every voter can take his choice, and pick out his own "Queen of the May."

Recently in Saratoga a Hebrew gentleman, who appears to have had as much money as brains, and who is very fond of jewels, bought a dog collar for \$1,800 which he clasped about the neck of Lillian Russell's dear little dog. Wherefore?

California is to have a raisin trust. A company has purchased 1,200 car loads of the carry-over crop of last year, and expects to gain control of the 5,000 car loads of this year's crop. The stock has been put on the market in the sum of \$1,000,000.

The strike in Fall River continues, and there is much suffering. Local business men of that city have given 1,000 baskets of food to be distributed among the strikers. And it is reported that a citizen has offered to back the striking unions with \$50,000.

A company of sixty-eight Austrian merchants and manufacturers are touring this country, on their way to St. Louis, hoping to strengthen commercial relations between Austria and the States. They expressed themselves as amazed at the commercial activity they saw in New York.

Mr. William Weightman, born a poor man in Lincolnshire, England, recently died in Philadelphia, the richest man in that city. He left a fortune to his only daughter, Mrs. Walker, estimated at \$50,000,000. She is a widow and can do exactly whatever she likes with the whole.

It took the 700 men from Fort Ethan Allan in Vermont, sixteen days to cross New York state to a point 25 miles east of Binghampton, on their way to meet the enemy in Virginia. This is certainly not very remarkable for speed. They arrived covered with dust and other marks of their long journey. The rest of the trip to Manassas was performed by rail.

Dr. Davidson, the archbishop of Canterbury, has arrived in America, but instead of spending a week at Fernleigh, Bishop Potter's country seat near Cooperstown, New York, as was announced, he skipped for Quebec. With him are his wife, the Vicar of Windsor, and two chaplains. When asked what he thought about Bishop Potter's subway saloon in New York, where soft drinks and alcoholic foods are dispensed, the Primate of all England replied that only a few weeks ago his wife assisted at the opening of a similar saloon in Surrey, London. He didn't see anything funny about Bishop Potter's new enterprise.

Late War News.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 7.—General Kuropatkin has arrived at Mukden.

Birmingham, Sept. 7.—The Post today reports that in consequence of Russian communications from the British and French governments and strong representations from China against General Ma's troops, 50,000 in number, entering Manchuria. Such a movement would create the most serious international situation developed in years.

Rome, Sept. 7.—A Yen Tai dispatch states that the Russian army under Kuropatkin is abandoning their wounded owing to a lack of ambulances. Many of the injured are dying of hunger and thirst. An epidemic of disease is now feared.

Mukden, Sept. 6.—(Delayed in Transmission.)—A part of the Russian army which is coming to Mukden by the wagon road is in danger of being cut off.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 7.—It is announced that nearly all of the Russian troops that were retreating from Liao Yang have arrived at Mukden or in the immediate vicinity. General Kuropatkin has arrived and is personally directing the operations.

Quite a bit of excitement was caused here Wednesday by a runaway team on Front street, which belonged to W. J. Lichty, of Lee. The team was hitched to a light wagon and was standing near Lorenz's store when they took fright and started to run. J. W. Wood was standing at the horses' heads and did what he could to prevent their running, but they were too lively for the old man and he was thrown to the ground with great force, inflicting several ugly wounds about his face. Burt Hollenbeck caught one of the animals by the bit and stayed with them to the foot of Hall street on the bridge up which street they turned, where he let go, and as the turn was made the wagon up set. The vehicle contained but one occupant, Mr. Lichty's little boy, aged about four or five years, who went out as the wagon upset, and was somewhat bruised about the face, but not seriously hurt. The wagon and harness were somewhat broken up as all three, Mr. Wood, Mr. Hollenbeck and the little boy all had narrow escapes from severe or fatal injuries, it may be considered a very lucky affair.

From the Coos Bay News. Wm. Lackstrom and John Matson will soon commence work on a new school house at Sumner. The building will be 26x42 feet, and two ante rooms.

We understand that L. F. Jones will soon return from San Francisco, and that he has made arrangements to resume work at the Crescent mine.

Victor Miller, who was seriously injured at Beaver Hill lately, by a peice of a steel wedge cutting through his intestines, is gradually improving, and Dr. Mings is very sanguine of his recovery.

Members of the Marshfield football team are talking of reorganizing, and would like to see a league formed with Coquille, Bandon, Myrtle Point and North Bend. We hope they will be successful.

Wm. Bernitt returned from South slough Saturday morning, where he had been employed in connection with the construction of the county ferry. He informed us that the work was completed, and that teams can now make the trip from the bay to the lighthouse.

C. D. McFairlin and wife, of North slough, had business in Marshfield, Saturday. Mr. McFairlin says that a number of new arrivals are going into cranberry raising in that vicinity, and in a few years there will be a big output of berries on North slough.

M. A. Flaherty, who was a section boss here when R. A. Gramam was in charge of the railroad, has returned to the bay, and has been given the position of road master by Manager Chandler. It is said that as soon as material can be procured, some substantial repairs will be made on the road.
