**Council Proceedings.**

Regular monthly session. Common council met in regular monthly session on the 5th inst. Present, all its members except Councilman Leach and His Honor the Mayor, Chairman B. H. Burns in the chair.

Minutes of last three meetings were read and approved. The regular monthly reports of the City Recorder, Treasurer and Marshal were read referred to finance committee.

Petitions: First, for two new street lights at or about the North end of Moulton street bridge, and Sixth and Taylor streets. Granted. Second: To have an ordinance passed and enforced relative to peddlers and other transient tradesmen. Granted. Ordinance to be prepared accordingly for future consideration.

Third: For the renewing of Baxter Bros', saloon license for six months from and after September 16, 1904, and the records and files of the recorder's office and showing them to have complied with the law, the petition was granted.

Total 306 00 Two other bills were laid over for further consideration and explanation. T. J. Thrift asked for new sidewalk on North side of Watkins street, Nosler's Addition, and steps inaugurated for the purpose of having it so done.

In reopening of "B" street through the property of B. C. Agee no appeals having been taken from the verdict of appraisers, rendered on the 10th ult, the same was duly confirmed and approved and damages voted Mr. Agee as per above Fund for the payment of the same. Net \$150.00.

The city marshal was directed to look sharply after all who had been notified to repair or rebuild their sidewalks under an ordinance adopted for that purpose August 10, 1904.

It was further ordered that a "four-ply" barbed wire fence be built around the city water reservoirs and that the same be done under the direction of the marshal.

Also the SEMI-WEEKLY HERALD was designated by the Council as the official paper of the city. Adjourned at 11.15 p. m. E. G. D. HOLDEN, City Recorder.
